Ferndale Mayor's Race More Than Just A Gay 'Duel,' Four On Ballot For Nov. 5

FERNDALE - The Ferndale election has already garnered international attention. USA Today ran an article about the challenge. The Detroit Free Press called it a "duel." The Washington Times headline says "Michigan Mayoral Race Pits Gay Man vs. Gay Man," and even says, "Some gays worry the race might cause divide and suggest that former mayor Craig Covey's run will actually turn back the clock on homosexual rights with his attacks on the current mayor Dave Coulter."

And while it is true that having Michigan's first openly-gay elected mayor running against its second is a rare occurrence, in Ferndale the focus is more about the issues. Most local residents care more about the issues facing the city than about the sexual orientation of their elected officials.

"Having a gay candidate for mayor of Ferndale is so late 1990s. It's not a story anymore and never should've been in the first place," said Ferndale resident Chris Ernest. "The people of the city of Ferndale have always been a brother and sisterhood of kindred spirits that believe we are all one. There is no such thing as gay, or black or white in Ferndale. It's being a part of something cool!"

Two Other Candidates

For one thing, the race is not just between two gay men. There are two other candidates running for the office. For what it's worth to those who track demographics, the two lesser-known opponents are women.

Sherry Wells, who is a Democrat, has lived in Ferndale for 25 years and was part of the Charter Revision Commission in the 1990s. She and her daughter live near downtown. She is a former member of the Ferndale Rotary, part of Ferndale Seniors, a former member of the Ferndale Area Chamber

Parton filed petitions on Aug. 13. She is 55 years old and the mother of three sons, one daughter and two stepsons. She was the leader of the Ferndale Cub Scout Pack 1245 for five years and has held the positions of vice president and secretary for the Ferndale Elementary PTA. She has volunteered to do photography for the Ferndale High School Musical program, and she is

of Commerce and has been a consistent presence at council meetings giving announcements about various events. She was especially vocal on the issue of creating a noise ordinance for the city. At a recent city council meeting she said that she gathered 120 signatures to get her name on the ballot, with 42 percent of them are on the east side of the city. "Your mayor should be the face of Ferndale and I will do that for you," Wells said, noting that because she does not work full time she has more time to devote to community involvement.

Linda Parton and her husband Joe have lived in Ferndale for 23 years.

active at Woodlawn Church in Royal Oak. She works as a photographer and is listed on her Facebook page as a conservative. "One definite item I will work on, will be to cost effectively eliminate the new parking 'Pay Stations' by Digital," she said. "No one likes them, residents, visitors and businesses alike."

These two candidates, who have significantly less experience with campaigning and public office, are easily overlooked by the media. Both Coulter and Covey are seasoned politicians and public community activists. Not only have they worked for

equality in the LGBT community and ending the AIDS epidemic, they have each worked on other issues that have nothing to do with being gay.

Coulter is involved in the Democratic Party. He is one of the vice chairs of the statewide LGBT caucus, but before that he served as chair of the 9th congressional district. He served four terms as Oakland county commissioner (2002-2010), was on the Human Rights Ordinance committee of 1999, and served on the library board from 2004-2005. He was the executive director of the Michigan AIDS Fund and is currently program officer for Children's Hospital of Michigan. He's been mayor since 2011, and is running on a platform of financial health for the city, making it more business-friendly, building strong community through parks and a clean sweep program, and looking at quality of life for residents.

While Covey is also a Democrat, he's better known for the way he parties than sticking to party politics. His forte is creating grand events like the Ferndale Pub Crawl, the Ferndale Blues Festival and Ferndale Pride, as ways to raise money for charities. Covey served on city council from 2000-2007 before becoming the first openly gay elected mayor in Michigan in 2008. In 2010 he gave up the seat when he won the seat on the county commission left vacant by Coulter when Coulter gave it up in an unsuccessful run for State Senate. Covey was the CEO of Michigan AIDS Prevention Project, which later became Michigan AIDS Coalition. He's on the board

of the Ferndale Community Foundation, Ferndale Youth Assistance and is leading the push to decriminalize marijuana in the city.

"I am not running against anyone. I am running for the people of Ferndale," he's stated several times. His issues involve concern over government spending, including the new parking system. He blames the current council for the city's high water bills and "the feeling that some city government activities are getting more complicated, more complex and less efficient."

Friend Against Friend

The race does pit friend against friend, and the salacious national media may only be doing what is expected of them. Comments on regional and national news sites vary from jokes about missing Detroit city council President Charles Pugh returning to Ferndale to make it a threesome, to a quip about voting for the one who has the most Liza Minelli paraphernalia. And of course a slew of bigots hoping neither of them win, using the contest as evidence that LGBT people are dramatic.

But it also is indicative of a more peaceful larger circumstance – greater LGBT acceptance.

Mark LaChey, chair of the Michigan Democratic LGBT Caucus put the race in a broader perspective. "Of course, it's historic for Michigan and nationally and demonstrates the degree of acceptance of openly LGBT candidates and elected officials in Ferndale and Southeast Michigan. In many ways, their sexual orientation

is no more of an issue than their height or hair color... truly a non-issue. Especially when considering that the third and fourth candidates are not running as the anti-gay or straight alternative to Dave and Craig. This may be the ultimate evolution of LGBT politics (or that of any other minority) where candidates are judged on their qualifications, records and the issues," LaChey said.

Residents are less inclined to care, perhaps since they've had one gay mayor or the other for over a decade now. "Sexuality has nothing to do with it, they are two very unique candidates. May the best one win," said Ferndale resident Keith Eagles.

Having Covey running against Coulter may seem like revolution or like drama to the larger press, but at a local level it's no secret that the men share many of the same friends and voter base. The potential consequence of splitting that voter base may just mean that the city could end up losing their status as the only city with a gay mayor. In that case it could be the second time there has been a female one, with Mayor Pamela McCullough who was elected to serve as mayor in 1994. And while there are many women in political offices, the media still likes to portray female leadership as rare and progressive.

Whether this turns into a clichéd battle of the sexes, a duel between two gay men, or an all-around royal rumble, to those who live in the community the diversity and debate over everyday issues are all just Ferndale normal.

Those who visit the Stoli website will see statements about the Stoli relationship with the LGBT community. A letter from CEO Val Mendeleev explains that Stoli is actually headquartered in Latvia, an independent European Union state that was once part of the Soviet Union. The letter lists sponsorships of LGBT events over the years and around the world, including in South Africa, Vienna and Tel Aviv. They have many long-term partnerships in the United States as well.

"I want to stress that Stoli firmly opposes

such attitude and actions. Indeed, as a company that encourages transparency and fairness, we are upset and angry. Stolichnaya Vodka has always been, and continues to be a fervent supporter and friend to the LGBT community. We also thank the community for having adopted Stoli as their vodka of preference," Mendeleev wrote.

Ross is gay, and has written a book about his experience going from a small-town closeted kid and celebrity fan, to being famous himself. The book is called Man Up!: Tales of My Delusional Self-Confidence, and it's promoted as "a mission statement for anyone who doesn't fit the mold."

Cedar Point Cancels Wedding Contest Rather Than Include Gay Couples

Sandusky, OH – Cedar Point, a theme park well-known to LGBT Michiganders who flock to their unofficial Gay Day each June, has decided to cancel a wedding day contest rather than open it up to same-sex couples.

The contest was for 13 couples to be married in a horror-show-themed ceremony on Friday the 13th of September, the kickoff for HalloWeekends. The rules of the contest were clear however, due to marriage laws in Ohio, weddings are limited to male-female couples only.

Since receiving feedback from LGBT couples, the theme park has decided to end the promotion. A brief statement on their website says, "It's time to have a moment. "Real talk," as people are calling it.

"We've evaluated the 13 weddings promotion we recently announced and based on your feedback, we've decided that this isn't the right time for the event.

"However, on Friday the 13th, we do have a new haunted house for you to explore – and in the coming days, you'll get a seriously sinister sneak peek. Stay tuned."

Their "real talk," mentioned nothing about the reasons the contest was canceled,

although in a statement to the Sandusky Register, Cedar Point spokesperson Bryan Edawards said, "When the promotion logistics started to take on political undertones, as indicated by several guests who gave us feedback, it was decided that now is not the best time for this event. Cedar Point does not take any official stance on political issues."

The report indicated that not only were there to be new hetersexual marriages, but heterosexual couples who wanted to renew their vows could also have taken part in the ceremony.

Royal Oak Group Attacks LGBT Citizens

ROYAL OAK - The fight to protect Royal Oak's Human Rights Ordinance is in full swing as both sides have launched their websites and social media pages.

Just Royal Oak, the group opposed to the human rights ordinance on the Nov. 5 ballot, has launched a webpage showing their disdain for the "homosexual lifestyle" and trying to convince readers that gays are seeking "special rights" at the expense of the constitutional rights of others.

The site has sections for Privacy, Health and Legal Concerns, all of which play off stereotypes rather than giving complete information

Under Privacy Concerns they say, "Traditionally society has protected women and girls by setting aside 'female-only' areas, including restrooms; locker rooms; communal showers; hospital bed assignments; prisons; sports competitions; support groups; rape crisis centers; women's shelters; women's colleges; sex-based crime statistics; and women's health resources, statistics, and research endowments. So-called 'human rights' ordinances, such as the one being placed before Royal Oak voters as Proposal A, institute 'gender identity protections' and eliminate sex-based protections for women and girls. This means that any male

can identify himself as 'female' and enter previously protected areas at will."

Under Legal Concerns, Just Royal Oak gives several examples of pushback against discrimination, only one of which is a case where a local nondiscrimination ordinance was in place. In 2012, Hands On Originals, a local printing company, refused to fill an order for a gay organization that wanted t-shirts for a pride event. Because there was an ordinance in place, the organization was able to make a complaint. Just like a business that serves the public is not allowed to turn away people because of their skin color, their age, their religion or other factors that seem obvious, businesses that operate in communities with inclusive human rights ordinances cannot turn away people just because they are gay. The Just Royal Oak site claims this gives special

rights to gay people. But what it actually does is gives gay people the same access to public businesses as everyone else. The ordinance does not force it upon religious institutions.

And under Health Concerns they cherry-pick statistics and studies sometimes over a decade old, to make the claim that, "Judging by the years of life at risk, homosexual behavior is up to three times deadlier than smoking. Although society condemns, restricts, and spends millions of tax dollars to discourage the use of tobacco, many citizens advocate the social acceptance of homosexual behavior that results in significant health risks. Our laws should discourage ANY behavior that increases risk of disease and shortens life expectancy."

Just Royal Oak has also launched a Facebook page, which had just 62 "likes" at the time of this article's production. Two local women seem to be dominating the posts.

Fighting against the outdated data and stereotypes is the One Royal Oak campaign. Dave Garcia, Executive Director of Affirmations, said, "If you want to motivate your friends, go to that website," and One Royal Oak field organizer Megan Cece called it "disgusting."


One Royal Oak Seeks To Educate

So far the One Royal Oak campaign says they have knocked on 5,000 doors and been working to build bridges with local businesses and churches. "We need volunteer efforts," Cece said. "We are working out butts off 24/7."

Allison VanKuiken, who is leading the One Royal Oak campaign, says that combating the negative information is a priority. "The only real issues we've run into are cases of misinformation at the doors or on the phones and even then most people are pretty polite," she said.

"As people are learning about the work we are doing and what's at stake in Royal Oak, more folks have been expressing interest and asking about the campaign." VanKuiken says getting volunteers involved to help spread the proper information is what is most needed to make their campaign successful.

Janice Daniels Running For Troy City Council

TROY - Ousted Troy Mayor Janice Daniels is back in the political ring, this time running for Troy city council. Daniels was recalled in November 2012 after bringing the city into the national limelight by famously posting on Facebook, "I think I am going to throw away my 'I Love New York' carrying bag now that queers can get married there."

The group Recall Janice Daniels listed several reasons why the Tea Party Republican was unfit to be their mayor. Among them, in an awkward attempt to explain her Facebook anti-gay slur, she told a group of students she would "bring in psychiatrists who will tell you that the homosexual lifestyle is dangerous."

The group was also offended by a "position paper" Daniels read at a city council meeting where she avoided council rules and insulted the city manager and staff. Daniels also refused to take an oath of office recognizing the city charter and worked hard to undermine a Multi-Modal Transit Center that had been in the works for over a decade.

Voters removed her from office with 52.2 percent (20,763 votes) in favor of the recall, and 47.8 percent (18,993 votes) opposed.

Now Daniels is back, running for one of three open city council seats in a pool of 11 candidates. The requirement to get on the ballot for Troy city council is only 60 signatures, much fewer than the 9,000 signatures that were gathered to bring the issue of her removal onto the ballot in 2012. Terms last for four years.

She will face incumbents Ed Pennington and Wade Flemming and newcomers Olimpiu Apahidean, Steve Gottlieb, Ellen Hodorek, Thomas Kuhn, Rodger Walters, Scott Welborn, Jim Werpetinski and Neil Yashinsky.



Tom Zerafa Talks About His 40 Years Out Of The Closet

OAK PARK - There are those in the LGBT community who spend their lives working tirelessly behind the scenes that make the small steps and big strides possible. Perpetual volunteer Tom Zerafa of Oak Park is one such man. And at 62 years of age one thing that is interesting is not that he puts much thought into his birthdays, but instead puts his focus on a 40 year milestone – the anniversary of his coming out.

Each year he celebrates his coming out anniversary with a party to raise money for LGBT charities. This particular day has had such a profound effect on his life, and he feels that sharing it with others is not only a joy, but a responsibility. "Coming out is so important. The worst thing is to stay in a perpetual closet and hate yourself," he said.

Zerafa was raised in a Catholic home, and spent most of his career as a teacher and as a music minister at the Archdiocese of Detroit. His parents learned of his sexuality when he was 22-years-old. He'd been sick and in bed when they traveled to Michigan from their home in Florida. His mother came into his bedroom, but his father remained in the living room and took the opportunity to look at the books and magazines on Zerafa's bookshelf.

"I got a letter a couple of weeks later," he said. "My mother was nice about it. She said she hoped that I was feeling better, and that my father had been 'confused' by the literature he saw in my apartment." Zerafa said that while they struggled with it at first, they were never mean or judgmental with him and have long since been comfortable with who he is.

With his parents in Florida, Zerafa took the family values he grew up with and applied them to the dynamics of his chosen family. "When I found 'the family' finally, I came out of a strong ethnic background, and you pull your own weight when you're a member of the family. Everybody's got responsibility. You pay your dues. That's what being part of a family is. I grew up with that ethic," he said. "And when I came out and found my other family, it was time to start paying my dues. I wasn't going to sit around and be a bar fly or be the little sexpot, I had time for that later."

Zerafa got involved with many organizations and projects over the years, including Triangle Foundation. He has also been involved in dozens of other organizations and projects. Early on, he was part of the Wayne State Gay and Lesbian Liberation Front from 1973-1986. In the 80s he was also part of Dignity Detroit Area Gay



and Lesbian Council. He was a volunteer for Triangle, and among other things is currently on the Board of Michigan Coalition for Human Rights; is the Regional Coordinator for Move On.org, and is involved in the Affirmations Faith Task Force.

His advice to young people faced with coming out is simple and strong. "Stay focused. Find something you have passion to do. Make

sure your passion isn't just about you. Make sure your passion helps someone else, don't hold it back. Life is too short. Share your passion. Not just with one individual. The community needs your gifts. And don't let anybody tell you that you can't do something. That's so important. I know a lot of young people are very repressed."

Zerafa is currently volunteering with the One Royal Oak Campaign, heading up their faith-community outreach. He is also taking culinary classes in hopes of one day starting up a soup kitchen in the Oak Park or Ferndale area.

"My life is not about me. It's about service and I intend to do just that until my last breath. My bags are packed whenever God is ready to take me. I have no regrets in my life, just work to do," he said.

The lesson of the last 40 years is one he's not quite been able to impart to others as well as he'd like.

"In many cases we've gone forward, that we have organizations now that fit every need and breed in our community, but we're not doing any outreach to our allies. I belong to three peace action groups. I belong to the Sierra Club. I belong to several other organizations that are talking about





Harrisville Equalityfest Brings Pride To NE Mich.

HARRISVILLE - Way up north along the Lake Huron shoreline is a town of less than 500 people called Harrisville, Michigan. The town became the home of the region's first Equalityfest last weekend, attracting over 100 LGBT people and allies to the day of celebration and education.

Guests came from as far away as the Detroit area, with several being "up north" anyway to escape the massive Woodward Dream Cruise. Others drove for miles through rural Michigan to be part of the event.

Rev. Steven Hammond of Alpena Presbyterian Church came south about half an hour to attend. He has lived in several places through the country, but landed in Alpena nine years ago. When asked if Alpena is welcoming to the LGBT community, Hammond said optimistically, "It is improving." Recently a 25 year old drowned, and the tragedy brought the community together, he said. The young man was gay, and had been bullied in school. "His death made people rethink their behavior. People were not kind to him, but this reminded them to think about how they treat people. It's led to a lot of good conversations."

Hammond has experienced warmth first hand in the community as well. "My daughter and daughter-in-law were legally married in Connecticut. It's their 11 year anniversary of being committed, and they've been legally married five years. Our family picture is right up on the wall of the church, and no one has ever had anything negative to say about it," he said.

Patty Wackerly came up from Flint for Equalityfest. The prior weekend she had traveled down to Ferndale for the Transgender Pride in the Park picnic, and earlier this year she went to Flint Pride. "I don't consider myself transgender," she said. "I'm just a guy who likes to dress up. But I feel for transgender people. I don't struggle because I am comfortable when I am a man and when I am a woman. But I think of the struggles transgender people go through and I want to help support them, support their rights and so they can feel accepted." Wackerly has crossdressed in private at various times in life, but only began being Patty publically this past year. "I love it," she said. "Everybody's been nice so far." She said she is careful about where she goes, opting for art galleries and antique

U.S. Cong. Gary Peters Talks About Senate Campaign At Harrisville Equalityfest

Congressman Gary Peters is expecting a tough battle as he vies for the U.S. Senate seat that will be left vacant after 36-year-Senator Carl Levin ends his term in 2014. Peters, a Democrat from West Bloomfield, is already crisscrossing the state looking for support. And on Aug. 17 he made a surprise appearance at the Harrisville Equalityfest to talk about equal rights issues and the challenges his campaign faces.

"It's going to be a long, tough race. There's going to be a lot of money spent," he said.

"There is a slight Democratic majority in the Senate, about five seats. There are a number of seats that are going to be very difficult to hold... We will be targeted. I will have millions and millions of dollars spent against me from these outside groups that come in, these Super PACs that will come in to try and make sure that there is not a Democrat who wins this U.S. Senate seat."

So far, Peters' main opponent seems to be former Secretary of State and former Kent County Clerk Terri Lynn Land, a Republican from Byron Center near Grand Rapids.

Currently Peters represents the 9th Congressional District, which he says has

some unique characteristics. "I've got an interesting District now that winds through the Greater Detroit Area," Peters explained. "It's kind of an example of gerrymandering; in fact the New York Times did a story about the five ugliest Districts in America. My District ranked number four on the list of the five ugliest Districts. But that's only for the way it was drawn. It really is an incredibly diverse district, one that I'm very proud to represent, that stretches from the city of Pontiac, through West Bloomfield, Farmington Hills, Southfield, into Detroit, all of the Grosse Points, to the Downtown area south of the Ambassador Bridge. It's a District that brings Oakland County and Wayne County together."

But regardless of who he represents, Peters sees commonalities. "I find that people all care about the same things. People want good paying jobs. They want to have safe neighborhoods, affordable health care, to be able to retire with dignity," he said.

"When it comes to LGBT issues... these are issues I fought for, for many, many years. In fact, I was a supporter of marriage equality before it was as popular as it is now. Years and years ago, in fact when I ran for Attorney General in 2002, I was very outspoken in support of marriage equality. And in fact, the number one ad they ran against me was the fact that I supported marriage equality in 2002. I was proud to take that position then, and I'm proud to take that position now. And thank God we're making headway finally in that."

Peters is a member of the LGBT Caucus in Congress, and one of the issues he fought for there was the repeal of Don't Ask, Don't Tell in the military. He served as a Lt. Commander in the Navy and said that when he was there it did not matter what a person's sexual orientation was, only that they were patriotic and willing to serve their country.


Along the lines of patriotism, Peters said, "When you stand up for the U.S. Consitution, when you stand up for equal rights, that means everybody in this country, not picking and choosing certain individuals. Everybody has equal rights. Bottom line, no exception."





Protestant Group Hires Trans Man As Executive Director

An LGBT advocacy organization within one of the nation's foremost Christian denominations announced its new executive director, Alex McNeill, who, in making history, becomes the first openly transgender leader of a mainline Protestant group.

"I'm honored to join More Light Presbyterians, which has always been on the forefront of the Christian tradition of fostering acceptance for the most vulnerable among us," said McNeil, 30, in a press statement announcing his appointment, which takes effect later this month.

"Following the risen Christ, and seeking to make the church a true community of hospitality," the mission of More Light Presbyterians (MLP), based in Minnetonka, Minnesota, is "to work for the full participation of lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender and queer people in the life, ministry and witness of the Presbyterian Church (USA) and in society."

"Our search committee unanimously chose Alex because he has a proven track record of leading and growing organizations," said Nathan Sobers, co-moderator of MLP. "We believe that he is uniquely qualified to lead More Light during this important moment in the church."

In the secular arena, McNeill has campaigned for ballot measures and legislation to promote LGBT rights. For example, he served as communications and development director and field director for Equality Maryland and was active last fall in the successful ballot measure that secured same-sex civil marriage in that state.

Within his denomination, moreover, McNeill worked to secure ordination equality for Presbyterians and celebrated that success by becoming the first openly transgender ministry candidate from his home presbytery in western North Carolina

He holds a bachelor's degree in religious studies from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and a master of divinity from the Harvard Divinity School.

McNeill came out as a lesbian at the age of 18 and to family and friends as transgender six years ago. At 22, he entered the ordination process and

came out transgender to his ordination committee last year.

The feature-length documentary film Out of Order chronicles the lives of three queer Presbyterians, including McNeill, seeking to be ordained ministers in the church.

It was in July 2010 when Presbyterian activists succeeded in dismantling a gay ordination ban – dating back to

1978 – during a meeting of the 2.1 million-member's general assembly, a gathering held in Minneapolis. There, the denomination's highest governing body voted to approve Amendment 10-A, which deleted language in the denomination's Book of Order that in effect barred the ordination of noncelibate gay candidates by requiring them "to live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and woman or chastity in singleness."

New language required that "the governing body responsible for ordination and/or installation shall examine each candidate's calling, gifts, preparation, and suitability."

But before the official change in church policy could be implemented, however, a majority of the 173 regional presbyteries were also required to approve the measure.

That happened just over two years ago when formal approval of Amendment 10-A came with a favorable vote for it by the Twin Cities presbytery, a regional governing district.

The new policy took effect in July 2011.

During a recent telephone conversation, McNeill spoke about his appointment and plans for future advocacy within the Presbyterian Church (USA).

"Changing our standards around samesex marriage, allowing ministers to marry same-sex couples is a big priority," he said.

McNeill was referring to a 2012 Pittsburgh gathering, or general assembly, which failed to reformulate church understanding of marriage to include gay and lesbian couples.

Beyond securing marriage equality, he said, "More Light wants to deepen its welcome to LGBT people in our churches. We know a lot of education needs to be done, for example, to help people feel better equipped to welcome transgender people. We also want to help folks who are believers in More Light to take their welcome out of the their congregations and into their communities and advocate for good causes and practices that affirms LGBT people as full citizens in the communities where they live."

More Light Presbyterian's operating budget is approximately \$300,000, and McNeill's salary is \$78,000.

A North Carolina native and raised "deeply Presbyterian," McNeill said, in addition to the denomination's social justice ethic, "what my tradition has taught me and reinforced is a belief that everyone has the ability to be a minister or a change agent."

"Ministers are people who are called out a community but not above a community," explained McNeill. "The ability of people to be called, use their voices, and really make a difference," he added, "is one of my uniquely Presbyterian values."

McNeill sees opportunities with congregations and communities for more conversations and fuller discussions about "what transgender means" and "how we all have our identities and what can happen when we commonly acknowledge" that reality, he said.

"I like to encourage people to tell their gender stories and how they learned about their gender identity," said McNeill. "There are a lot of commonalities across the transgender and non-transgender spectrum."

shops where there isn't much social pressure or interaction.

Harrisville itself is home to at least a handful of LGBT people. Dave Morey said, "As a gay man in northeast Michigan I like to see the awareness there are LGBT people here. And this gives a chance for us to invite the straight people to come meet us and see what we're like. We're not here to steal your children or whatever."

Morey grew up in Royal Oak, and spent much of his life out in California. He moved to Harrisville to "get away from it all," and is happy being single and spending time with his friends, who are all straight. "I've met a few guys here and there who call themselves 'bi-curious.' No one uses the word gay up here, it's always 'bi-curious.' But apart from that there isn't really any way for gay people to meet each other. Craigslist a little bit, but even that is not very active. I'm okay with it. I've been fortunate that I've had a couple of long term relationships in my life. I'm happy on my own."

Though he is open about his sexuality, Morey has only had two incidents where it was an issue. "There was one guy who I was friends with who said he couldn't pal around with me anymore because he didn't want people to think he was gay. And I said 'well okay,' and that was it.

The other was one time I was up at the bar and there was some women in bikinis on the TV and one guy made a comment to me that a gal like that could turn a gay man straight. I had a good response to him though. I said 'You know what would really turn a gay man straight? A guy like you.'That got a good laugh and that was it. Most people up here are really laid back, or if they do have a problem with something they don't say it."

Dawn Huaman says she gets strange looks around town, but hasn't had any problems. Her friend Jessica Bassing happened to be in town from Germany and was excited to come to the Harrisville Equalityfest. She's been to Pride events all over the world, including Amsterdam the weekend before.

"In Amsterdam the whole city gets involved in Pride. There are signs everywhere saying 'We're with you,'" Bassing said. "This is not like Amsterdam, but it is nice to see this event and that people are trying to start one here."

Many of the 100 or so attendees were allies and people involved in progressive movements in that area. The event was organized by Harrisville Holistic Center, and the Alcona County Democrats sold baked goods as a fundraiser for their group.

Rev. Dr. Mel White of California came in to be the keynote speaker, talking about his national movement called Soulforce and how principles of Martin Luther King, Ghandi and Jesus can be applied to the movement for equality for all people. He stressed the importance of loving one's enemy and recognizing the humanity that is in them.

The event also attracted statewide political attention, with State Sen. Rebekah Warren (D-Ann Arbor) giving a talk updating the public about what progress is being made towards equal rights. She has introduced bills for second parent adoption, marriage and civil rights protections, and said that a bi-partisan move to amend Michigan's civil rights law, Elliot Larson, is likely to happen in 2014.

U.S. Rep. Gary Peters (D-MI 14) also spoke to the crowd about the need to support candidates that are vocal about equal rights. Peters is running for U.S. Senate and was on an "up north" tour to meet potential voters.



Obama Awards Bayard Rustin The Presidential Medal of Freedom

On August 8 the White House announced that Bayard Rustin, the trailblazing civil rights activist, would be posthumously awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian award in the U.S.

Rustin was a key advisor to Martin Luther King and the primary organizer of the 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom. Many Americans will be celebrating that event's 50th anniversary on August 28, and insisting that the country complete the march's unfinished business of economic justice, full employment, voting rights, and equal opportunity.



Honoring Rustin with the Medal of Freedom tells us something about how far America has come as a nation in the past 50 years. After all, he had four strikes against him. He was a pacifist, a radical, black and gay.

Controversy surrounded him all his life.

From the 1940s through the 1960s, Rustin marshaled his considerable talents -- as an organizer, strategist, speaker and writer -- to challenge the economic and racial status quo. Always an outsider, he helped catalyze the civil-rights movement with courageous acts of resistance. Rustin was a brilliant thinker and strategist, but given his political liabilities as a gay, black, radical pacifist, he also relied on his incredible charm to win converts to the causes of peace and civil rights. A remarkable tenor, he frequently sang gospel and blues songs for his audiences. Had he not become an organizer, he could have become a popular entertainer.

Rustin is not as well known as other civil rights leaders in large part because of his homosexuality and his brief flirtation, during his twenties, with Communism. Although highly respected in labor, pacifist, and civil rights circles, he was typically a behind-the-scenes organizer rather than a public figure.

But last year -- the 100th anniversary of his birth and 25 years after his death -- Rustin's name was name is back in the news. A number of civil rights and gay rights groups honored Rustin with conferences, museum exhibits and other events. In addition, in the wake of President Barack Obama's support for same-sex marriage last year, the issue of homosexuality within the black community -- including the civil rights movement and the black church -- triggered some controversy. Now, with the with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, Rustin may finally be getting the recognition he deserves as a human rights pioneer.

50 years Of Marching And Still A Long Way To Go

hether you participated in the historic March on Washington in 1963, weren't even a twinkle in your parents eyes or fall some were in between, it behooves each of us – black, white, brown, young, old, gay and straight to take a moment as we celebrate this 50th anniversary to not only reflect upon where we have come as a nation but engage in real, heartfelt, even difficult conversations on the task before us to finish the work of those 250,000 Americans who descended on Washington DC August 28, 1963.

Although this March holds special significance for the African American community and its struggle for civil rights (a struggle that continues), it holds an even greater significance in the evolution of the nation founded on the premise that "all men are created equal."

The evolutionary struggle of this country to become a more perfect union, to expand upon the founding fathers' literal interpretation of "men" to be more diverse and inclusive of all Americans, began before the ink was even dry on the "Declaration of Independence." For women, immigrants, the poor, people of color and African Americans the path to equality was and is not easy.

The 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom was organized by civil rights, labor, and religious organizations for civil and economic rights for African Americans. Approximately 75-80% of the participants were African Americans. The rest represented a cross-section of America who marched for freedom and heard Dr. King's message of racial harmony and equality.

The march is widely credited with helping to pass the Civil Rights Act (1964) and the Voting Rights Act (1965). Legislation that until recently have provided a gateway and protections to millions of Americans.

Dr. King's words called upon those 250,000 marchers, the nation and generations today, as individuals and a nation, to rise up and live out the true meaning of the promise of America.

Yes, we've come a long way. You can find African Americans, women, people of color, and LGBT Americans in places and

positions that 50 years ago would have been unthought-of and certainly unheard of. The roll call of change is lengthy but one name sums it up – President Barack Obama.

And it's not just in the African American community, women have "come a long way baby" with power houses like Meg Whitman, Marissa Mayer, Ingrid Saunders Jones and of course the goddess of all things media Oprah Winfrey.

The LGBT community is taking it's place with more and more private individuals making it public (code for coming out) each day. And at long last Bayard Rustin, civil rights activist, chief organizer of the March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom and gay activist received his long overdue recognition in August 2013 when President Barack Obama posthumously awarded Rustin the Presidential Medal of Freedom

President Obama also announced that Astronaut Sally Ride would receive the Presidential Medal of Freedom.

Yes we've come a long way, but there is still a long way to go. Because as Dr. King said, "When the architects of our republic wrote the magnificent words of the Constitution and the Declaration of Independence, they were signing a promissory note to which every American was to fall heir. This note was a promise that all men (of us)....would be guaranteed the unalienable rights of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

With women still lacking wage parity with their male counterparts; with more African Americans/POC incarcerated than in college; with the disproportionate distribution of wealth to an elite few while more and more families slip into poverty; with LGBT employees living under the threat of losing their jobs just because they're gay; with women's reproductive rights under attack; with LGBT families lacking legal protections of every other family; with voters disenfranchised/disempowered and with our youth under attack physically, economically and politically, it is safe to say that America is still giving, as Dr. King said, "people a bad check, a check which has come back marked 'insufficient funds."

In 1963, Robert Avery was fifteen. With a friend he hitch-hiked from Gadsden, Alabama to Washington ,DC. He was interviewed and seen briefly in the documentary "The March." As part of NPR's "Race Card Project" Avery was asked to share six words about the progress made since the March on Washington. Avery is on the city council of Gadsden and might be seen as symbolic of the progress since 1963, but his words speak the greater truth. His six words "Not far, long way to go."

This August 28, 2013 in Washington, DC or wherever you find yourself, be you black, white, brown, young, old, LGBT, straight, it's time we come together and cash that check, to make good on that promissory note. We do this by not only calling on/out our elected officials but by engaging in those real, heartfelt, even difficult conversations then finishing the work by being the change we want to see.

New York Community Leaders Respond To Apparent Anti-gay Attack

CNN - Police are searching for the men involved in an apparent anti-gay assault that had New York community leaders coming together Thursday to raise awareness.

New York State Sen. Brad Hoylman and City Council Speaker Christine Quinn handed out flyers Thursday morning to spread the word about what police are calling a hate crime attack on two men Wednesday.

The two officials asked the community to stay vigilant and help catch the men, according to a statement released by Hoylman.

The victims were assaulted by two men in the Chelsea neighborhood of Manhattan early Wednesday morning. The attackers used derogatory words about the victims' sexual orientations, New York Police Detective Marc Nell said

The victims suffered facial injuries, Nell said, and were treated at Beth Israel Hospital.

"It makes me sick to my stomach," Michael Felenchak, one of the victims, told CNN affiliate WABC. "It scares me. It upsets me. It's really awful."

Felenchak, 27, had to have multiple stitches on his chin and suffered scrapes across his stomach from the attack.

"First they punched me so hard, I feel brass knuckles," the other victim, Peter Nortman, 53, told WABC. "Then I fell on the floor, and I jumped back up and I got hit again. And then I tried to pull them down."

Quinn held a news conference Wednesday evening after hearing about the attack. Both victims were on hand.

"I am appalled by reports that two men were senselessly beaten in Chelsea simply because they were perceived to be gay," Quinn said. She said the pair were holding hands at the time of the attack.

She called the attackers cowardly and said they do not represent New Yorkers. She urged the community not to be intimidated by such violence.

There have been nine hate crimes against lesbian, gay, bisexual or transgender people in Manhattan since May 5, according to Hoylman's statement

Hoylman, Quinn and police urge anyone with information about the assaults to come forward. No suspects have been identified as investigation continues

California Supreme Court Denies Latest Bid To Revive Gay Marriage Ban

CNN - Those trying to reinstitute Proposition 8 - the voter-backed referendum to ban gay marriage in California - lost once again in court on Aug. 14, meaning no stop to such legal unions that resumed a few weeks ago.

In two brief rulings, California Supreme Court Chief Justice Tani Gorre Cantil-Sakauye dismissed attempts by opponents of same-sex marriage.

One was brought by ProtectMarriage. com, the group that's led legal efforts defending what's known as Prop 8, and the other came from a San Diego County clerk who'd argued the state had put him in an "untenable position" by compelling him to sign off on marriage licenses for gay and lesbian couples.

The rulings were the latest in a spate of decisions - at the state and federal level, including the U.S. Supreme Court - that have gone against those trying to restrict marriage in the Golden State to between one man and one woman.

Attorney General Kamala Harris was among those gay marriage supporters who cheered the ruling, much as they have the others in recent months. She tweeted: "The CA Supreme court has denied the #Prop8 proponents' request to halt same-sex marriages!"

"#Prop8 dead for good," tweeted Equality California, the state's biggest gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender advocacy group. "CA Supr. Ct. refuses last remaining legal challenge. Freedom to marry here to stay."

Those on the other side of the debate, meanwhile, lamented the ruling and more generally criticized state leaders who, in their view, had "silenced more than 7 million Californians who clearly expressed their views."

"Though the current California officials are unwilling to support the state constitution, we remain hopeful that one day Californians will elect officials who will," Alliance Defending Freedom, a legal advocacy organization, said in a statement. "... The court's decision today ... does not end the debate about marriage in California."

In May 2008, California's Supreme Court struck down the state's ban on same-sex marriage, ruling that the state's constitution gives "this basic civil right to (marry to) all Californians, whether gay or heterosexual, and to same-sex couples as well as to opposite-sex couples."

The tide turned a few months later, when 52% of voters backed Proposition 8 to halt gay and lesbian marriages.

Yet state officials declined to stand behind the prohibition, even if private parties did. A federal appeals court subsequently ruled that Proposition 8 was unconstitutional, though it still issued a stay on same-sex marriages until the U.S. Supreme Court could weigh in.

That happened June 26, when the nation's high court -- in a 5-4 decision -- dismissed an appeal of the earlier lower court ruling on narrow, jurisdictional grounds.

Two days later, the Ninth U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals officially lifted the previous injunction, and same-sex weddings took place very soon thereafter.

Proposition 8 backers tried to get the U.S. Supreme Court to again intervene, but Justice Anthony Kennedy refused to do so.

Efforts continued, though, in the state court system.

One came from San Diego County Clerk Ernest Dronenburg, who last month asked the California Supreme Court to order Gov. Jerry Brown, Harris and other state officials to abide by an "immediate temporary stay" to once again halt same-sex marriages.

Dronenburg argued that he had been "threatened with legal action by the attorney general for exercising his public duties consistent with state law defining marriage as the union between one man and one woman."

Yet the state Supreme Court responded days later by denying the county clerk's request to stop same-sex marriages immediately. On Aug.14, Cantil-Sakauye officially dismissed Dronenburg's petition.



HIV criminalization as a problem, it is odd that Michigan's health department has chosen to put their review process 'on hold' with no timetable or plan for completion," says Sean Strub, executive director of Sero Project, a national organization dedicated to ending HIV criminalization. "While the bureaucracy dilly-dallies, Michigan public health suffers."

"It would very discouraging for the Department to discontinue reviewing its policies to encourage people to get tested for HIV, while at the same time protecting both their confidentiality and respecting their constitutional rights, " said Jay Kaplan, attorney with ACLU Michigan's LGBT Project.

The department has been reviewing Michigan's HIV specific criminal law, MCL 333.5210, which makes it a felony for a person who knows he or she is infected with HIV to engage in sexual penetration, "however slight," without first disclosing that status to partners. The review is in response, in part, to the federal government's National HIV/ AIDS Strategy released in July 2010. That document encouraged states to review the laws and directed the Department of Justice to provide

technical assistance in the reviews.

Michigan is one of 32 U.S. states and two territories with such HIV specific laws, and recent years, those laws have come under increasing scrutiny. Academic studies have found the laws have no impact on risk behavior and transmission rates in states with such laws and without them are comparable. A study in Ottawa Canada found that high profile prosecutions also prevented a small percentage of men who have sex with men who were most at risk for infection from being tested for

the virus or discussing their sexual health and activity with medical professionals.

In addition to the scientific findings, the Global Commission on HIV and the Law - a United Nations commission – issued a report last year calling for the elimination of such laws. Other organizations such as the National Association of State and Territorial AIDS Directors and the HIV Medicine Association have also called for the elimination of the laws. And in June. California Democratic Congresswoman Barbara Lee was able to attach an amendment to the National Defense Authorization Act requiring the Department of Defense to review policies and prosecutions of service members living with HIV.

Susan Grimes Gilbert, formerly Susan Grimes Munson, was a state Republican lawmaker who pushed the 1989 disclosure law through the legislature. She has since announced the law is not working and that she is working on its repeal.

According to documents obtained from MDCH, the state began reviewing the laws in July of 2012. In December 2012, the state released a July memo, as well as three drafts all from November 2012, of an internal report on the law.

The memo, from Mikelle Robinson, director Bureau of Local Health and Administrative Services, was written July 23, 2012. Robinson writes that subjecting Section 52 of the Public Health Code to legislative action would be a poor choice at

"Recognizing the importance of Part 52 and the risk of untoward amendments the division recommends against opening it up for revisions," Robinson wrote. Emphasis in the original. She then proceeds to lay out two options to address MCL 333.5210, Michigan's HIV-specific disclosure law.

The first option is to "rescind" the section altogether. The second option is to amend the section to address only those who are intent on infecting their partners -- which she notes is "atypical and uncommon."

The draft reports, which were written by a variety of staff in the HIV/ AIDS Prevention and Intervention Section (HAPIS), vary only slightly from one and other - although those slight variations would have significant policy impact.

In the first draft, dated Nov. 1 and the second, dated Nov. 16, staff recommended the adoption of the policy construction substantially similar to recommendations from the Center for HIV Law and Policy in New York City as well as the Global Commission on HIV and the Law.

"In cases involving the willful and knowing spread of HIV and other hazardous communicable diseases," the MDCH staff wrote, "ensure that prosecution requires proof of intent to harm, conduct that is likely to result in that harm, proof the conduct of the accused in fact resulted in

the alleged harm, and punishment that is proportionate to the actual harm caused by the defendant's conduct."

In the third draft released by MDCH, dated Nov. 29, that recommendation is removed.

In Michigan, Trevor Hoppe, a University of Michigan researcher and Ph.D. candidate, has raised significant concerns about the abuses of the state's laws related to HIV. He has identified 61 convictions in Michigan between 1992 and 2010, and reviewed just over 4,500 pages of trial transcripts from 46 of those cases.

In February, Hoppe published a study in the Journal Social Problems which found some local health departments participated in the prosecution of people living with HIV. The study was the result of interviews Hoppe conducted with various local health agencies to discuss the use of HIV specific laws in the state. MDCH vehemently denied Hoppe's findings were accurate.

But a 2009 memo from Grand Traverse County shows Hoppe's findings were, in fact, accurate. In the memo to Grand Traverse Prosecutor Al Schneider, from Grand Traverse Health Officer Fred Keeslar, Keeslar tells of receiving a complaint from Brian Simmerson of the Thomas Judd

to treating HIV in Traverse City about a man identified only as Mr. X.

Simmerson alleged that the man was engaging in 'unprotected' sexual activity with partners he met online and at a local public restroom without disclosing his HIV-positive status. Simmerson's sole source of the allegations comes as unsubstantiated statements from other, unidentified HIV-positive clients of the center.

Despite the fact the allegations were second hand statements from unidentified clients of the medical clinic, the health department initiated a health threat to others action against the man. Such an action is a civil action which can result in mandatory counseling, education or up to six months civil confinement.

"I suggest three options." Keeslar wrote to prosecutor Schneider in February 2009. "1. This Mr. X be warned by you and/or prosecuted for failure to inform his sex partners of his HIV status. 2. There be a "sting" operation by the police at the public bathroom where this person is reported to have had his encounters. 3. That I go public and inform the public via the media that this activity is happening and that anyone who has engaged in this behavior should get tested for HIV and other STI. I would not divulge the name of the person or the public bathrooms. 4. All or two of these options."

No evidence exists that any of Keeslar's recommendations were followed. Freedom of Information Act requests to police authorities in Grand Traverse County, including the city police, county sheriff and state police, who frequently conduct sex sting operations

Center - an medical center dedicated targeting men who have sex with men in the region, found no operations in 2009. A request to the office of the prosecutor uncovered no written responses or memos from Schneider about the case.

> The Thomas Judd Center declined to comment on the specifics of the case, or the requested actions from the health department to the prosecutor's office.

While health officials in the state continue to deny Hoppe's findings are accurate, cases of prosecutions uncovered by Hoppe are raising eyebrows.

> For instance, in 2009, an adult entertainer working in a strip club pleaded guilty to one count of Michigan's HIV disclosure law and was sentenced to five months in prison. According to trial transcripts obtained by Hoppe and shared with Between the Lines, the woman's alleged penetration could not transmit HIV.

> "[The confidential informant] would pay her twenty dollars a song for a lap dance, and on this

occasion she was topless, she began dancing, started grinding on him, trying to arouse his penis," the investigation detective told the court during a plea hearing. "At one point she exposed her vagina area to him and placed it on the tip of his nose and began grinding on his nose with her vagina."

The Prosecutor then asked, "Did the confidential informant indicate that his nose actually went inside or penetrated her vaginal area?"

"Yes, it did." the detective testified. There has never been a documented case of HIV transmission involving vaginal nasal penetration.

"I think that the MDCH staff who considered the problems with the existing law and proposed ways to modernize it deserve considerable credit for their leadership and clear vision of the big picture. Rather than assume, I and others at The Center for HIV Law and Policy, and members of the Positive Justice Project, will stay tuned to see whether the reorganized MDCH will continue the work completed so far. We stand ready to support an open, informed process of reform," said Catherine Hanssens, executive director of Center for HIV Law and Policy.

ow do you solve a problem like a tranny? How do you catch a gender and pin it down?

Those are the questions keeping Russell D. Moore up at



night. And so Moore, president of the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention, took to the pages of the Washington Post to ponder the "transgender question" in the wake of California's decision to protect transgender students from discrimination.

"Ultimately," Moore writes, "the transgender question is about more than just sex. It's about what it means to be human."

Exactly! Wow. This guy actually gets it. The root of the matter is basic human dignity. I mean,

what kind of person wouldn't want to protect transgender teens, a group of kids who are often misunderstood and face ridicule and harassment?

Moore continues, "Laws such as those in California will quickly test the boundaries of society's tolerance for a psychological and individualistic definition of gender. When gender identity is severed from biological sex, where does one's self-designation end, and who will be harmed in the process?"

"As conservative Christians," he writes, "we do not see transgendered persons as 'freaks' to be despised or ridiculed."

Or if *not* the anti-Christ, at least anti-Christ.

"The transgender question means that conservative Christian congregations such as mine must teach what's been handed down to us, that our maleness and femaleness points us to an even deeper reality, to the unity and complementarity of Christ and the church," he writes. "A rejection of the goodness of those creational realities then, is a revolt against God's lordship...'

Got that? If you've got a beef with your genitals, then you've got a beef with God. And God don't make junk. Or give you the wrong junk. Or something like that. Because God.



Lansing City Council Passes Resolution To Sever Ties With St. Petersburg

Confusion, Politics Continue To Cloud Move

LANSING – The Lansing City Council voted 7 to 0, with Councilmember Kathie Dunbar absent, to adopt a resolution condemning anti-gay violence and laws in Russia, and calling for an end to the Lansing Regional Sister Cities Commission relationship with St. Petersburg.

"The Lansing City Council strongly condemns the widespread abuses of human rights being perpetrated in St. Petersburg," the resolution reads. "The Lansing City Council urges the Lansing Regional Sister Cities Commission to sever all remaining ties, including references on its website and signage, with St. Petersburg."

Whether or not the city continues to have a relationship with St. Petersburg has been a matter of much confusion since First Ward Councilmember Jody Washington brought the issue forward in July. While the city continues to be listed on the city website for the Commission, as well as on signs welcoming visitors to the capitol, officials from the city

have called the relationship "dormant," then two weeks ago announced the relationship was severed "some years ago."

But in an email to Washington, shared with Between the Lines, Barbara Roberts Mason, the chair of the Commission, wrote, "At our January meeting in 2010 the LRSCC reviewed our status with St Petersburg, since the dissolution of the Kubyashi District. We did not vote to end/ sever the relationship, because no relationship existed and there was no one in Russia to contact. Subsequently, the Lansing/St Petersburg relationship was removed from the Sister Cities International Membership Directory and the city hall list on the window on the 9th floor. It is to be removed from the signs at the entrances to the city, when the city updates those signs."

In other words, the relationship was never formally severed, it was merely ended by benign neglect. Mason makes no mention of the website, however, the group's Facebook page indicated the website was out of date and needed to be updated.

Longtime LGBT ally Mayor Virg Bernero has opposed severing ties since the controversy erupted in July, but on Monday night found the final paragraph of the resolution something to oppose.

"The Lansing City Council requests the City of Lansing Human Relations and Community Service Department and/or Advisory Board prepare an annual report summarizing current human rights issues and challenges in each of Lansing's sister cities and submit the report to the Lansing City Council by the beginning of each calendar year," the resolution concludes.

Bernero tells the City Pulse, a weekly alternative newspaper in Lansing, that won't fly.

"It's certainly idiotic," Bernero told the newspaper after saying he was studying whether he could "simply" ignore the resolution or would have to veto it.

The passage comes as top Russian leaders have announced that the national ban on propaganda will be enforced during the 2014 Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia in February.

Gay Rights Campaigners Petition IOC Over Russia's Sochi Olympics

CNN- A 320,000-signature petition protesting Russia's stance on gay rights ahead of the Winter Olympics in Sochi early next year was presented to Olympic bosses in Switzerland on Wednesday.

The petition, delivered to the International Olympic Committee headquarters in Lausanne by gay rights group All Out, calls on Russia to repeal its anti-gay propaganda law in advance of the Sochi Games.

It also urges the IOC to condemn the law and urged Russia to ensure the security of all visitors, athletes and Russian people before, during, and after the Games.

Implemented last month, after Russian President Vladimir Putin signed it into effect, the law bars the public discussion of gay rights and relationships anywhere children might hear. It has been condemned by Russian and international rights groups as highly discriminatory.

"Ironically, the global outcry is

transforming Sochi into an amazing platform for Russians and athletes to defy the law and speak out on gay rights," said All Out co-founder and executive director Andre Banks.

About 50 Swiss members of All Out joined leaders of the organization to present the petition, said All Out spokesman Guillaume Bonnet.

The IOC said last week that it had "received assurances from the highest level of government in Russia that the legislation will not affect those attending or taking part in the Games."

But in a meeting Wednesday with All Out representatives, senior IOC staff said they would pursue a stronger, written commitment from the Russian government on the issue, Bonnet told

Such direct meetings between senior IOC staffers and protest groups are very rare, Bonnet said -- and a sign that the IOC is taking the matter "very seriously."

IOC spokeswoman Sandrine Tonge told CNN the IOC had met with

representatives of All Out, received their petition and "engaged in an open and constructive discussion."

The IOC reiterated its position "that sport is a human right and should be available to all regardless of race, sex or sexual orientation," she said.

"The Games themselves should be open to all, free of discrimination, and that applies to spectators, officials, media and, of course, athletes. We would oppose in the strongest terms any move that would jeopardise this principle."

The All Out petition was accompanied by a letter from British actor Stephen Fry and thousands of signatures from former Olympians and athletes collected by the group Athlete Ally, to show solidarity with the gay community.

Four-time Olympic gold medalist Greg Louganis, NFL linebacker Brendon Ayanbadejo, tennis player Mardy Fish and Australian women's cricket player Alex Blackwell were among those to put their name to the call for equal treatment for all.

Ross Mathews On Michigan Pride & His New Talk Show

R oss Mathews is talking to me from his own office in Hollywood and he can't believe it. "It's the dream," he says, bubbling over with joy. "I'm getting to do exactly what I've always wanted to do."

That dream began back in 2001 when the pop-culture fanatic landed a spot on "The Tonight Show with Jay Leno" as the host's buoyant intern. It wasn't long before Chelsea Handler took him under her wing and he

became the comedian's resident gay. Now, she's letting him fly solo: Mathews launches his very own show, "Hello Ross," with Handler co-producing, on Sept. 6 on the E! network.

Before the premiere, Mathews will serve as Michigan Pride's grand marshal on Aug. 24, when he'll spend the entire day in Lansing meeting the community and taking photos. "Come say hi to me," he insists.

In our recent chat, Mathew talks about how over-the-top gay his new show will be, why he learned to embrace his high-pitched voice and the trick to keeping it together when meeting Madonna.

What kind of message do you plan on bringing to Michigan Pride?

It's a wonderful time to be gay. You look at what the Supreme Court just did and what President Obama has said in terms of coming out in support of marriage equality, and it really is a new world. My book, "Man Up!," is all about celebrating what makes you different and using it to make you stand out

from the crowd. I think that message is more relevant and more welcome than ever, and that's what I'll be bringing to Pride.

When do you think you first felt like you could feel pride about being a gay man?

I felt it right away. The moment it became very clear to me, I was just full tilt. I was 100 percent. No matter what, you have to love yourself more than anybody else.

Your story of being this kid from a farm town who

didn't feel like he fit in, who was bullied and is now the star of his own show, must be really inspiring to young gay people. How do you hope your story inspires those who are going through what you went through as a young gay kid?

When I was growing up, I remember thinking, "What is my life gonna be like?" I didn't know what it meant to be a successful, happy, grown-up gay person because I didn't see that. I didn't see that in my small town. I didn't see that represented on television. Even when I started on television in 2001, it was really at the beginning, before "Queer Eye" and "Will & Grace," before Ellen was out, before Rosie was out; it really wasn't represented anywhere. I started appearing on national television as people like Rosie and Neil Patrick Harris came out and shows like those became relevant, and I was part of something.

From this point forward, whenever kids are realizing they're gay, they know what it means to be a happy, successful, openly and unapologetically grown-up gay person, and what that looks like and what life can be for them. And I hope people can see me on "Chelsea Lately" and see me on my show and say, "Hey, look, he's got a partner and a family and a dog and friends, and he never apologized for who he is and neither will I."

Do you realize that you are like the modern-day Ellen and the modern-day Rosie? You are now that person that you once looked up to.

OK, now that freaks me out! I have a lot more to achieve to reach anything like that, but I will gladly fulfill that role for people, whomever needs it. I feel like I have a big ol' wagon; everybody hop on it and let's do this together.

Who's the tougher boss: Jay Leno or Chelsea Handler?

(Laughs) Well, I would never categorize either one of them as tough in terms of tough on me. I will tell you, though: They've both given me incredible platforms, which is very rare for comics to do. I take it very seriously when they do that because they don't do it lightly, and I know if they give me that opportunity, I gotta show up and be on point. That's how you get the next opportunity. That's how this town works. You get a shot, you deliver and you get another one.

And now look at you in your own office.

I know. Isn't that nuts? And Chelsea is upstairs. You know, there's been two pivots in my life when it comes to my career: one was meeting Jay Leno and the other was meeting

Chelsea Handler, and both of them have been so instrumental and crucial and supportive and inspiring and have served as the most amazing mentors anybody in this town could ever have. I don't know what I ever did to deserve them, but I will spend the rest of my life thanking

Don't forget about Mark-Paul Gosselaar, who you interviewed recently when you guest hosted "Chelsea Lately."

When I guest hosted and I said, "Please welcome Mark-Paul Gosselaar," and he walked around the corner, it was like I needed a time machine to go back to myself at 12 years old in my bedroom and be like, "Oh my god, guess what he just said?" – because it was the most surreal thing in the world. (Laughs) All of a sudden he's there and he had heard me on "Howard Stern" talking about how, maybe, I had fantasized about him as a young kid watching "Saved by the Bell," and he said he heard that and told his wife and screamed, "Ross Mathews masturbated to me!" It really was like my head was going to explode.

No pun intended?

(Laughs) Hilarious!

Tell me about the "interactive" element of your new show.

It's a big party. This show is what I wish existed when I was a little kid, when I could reach out and be a part of pop culture. The audience is joining the conversation, and I'll literally be in the audience with a microphone asking people's opinions. When I have a guest, the people in the audience can ask the guest questions. We're Skype-ing people in from all over the country so they can ask questions as well. Everybody's welcome.

There's never been a show like this on TV then, has there?

No, there hasn't. I looked at all these shows that sort of talk about pop culture and the majority of them, if not all of them, were kind of saying, "Isn't she a dumb bitch?" "Isn't that stupid?" "He's so lame." There wasn't a show that was doing what I'm doing, which is saying, "I love this stuff, you guys love this stuff, let's talk it out."

How gay and fabulous is your set?


Oh my god, it's pretty great. It's a little Palm Spring chic-y, but very comfortable as well. We're trying to mix the two things. And it's all a little elevated because I am super gay, so it has to be; people would be disappointed if it wasn't.

Ellen has her dancing. Rosie had her Koosh balls. What will be your signature thing on this show?

I don't know! I think that kind of thing just evolves, so I'll figure that out. My thing is sort of interacting with the audience; this show is really for the fans, so if that's the legacy of this show, I'm thrilled with that.

How did you decide on "Hello Ross" as the name?

There was a lot of debate from a lot of people about the name, but there was never a debate on my end about the show. To me, it was always "Hello Ross." That's my Twitter, that's my website, that's the spirit of the show.

Chelsea is a producer on the show. How involved will she be?

She's been involved every step of the way. She sees the whole process and she's invested a lot in this. Not financially or anything like that, but to say, "I pick Ross, I think the audience wants to hear from Ross, I get behind Ross" means more to me than she'll ever know.

What have you learned from Chelsea about having your own show?

That there's a power in saying "I am what I am." Never second-guessing that thing that only you own and only you know, which is your point of view and your perception of things and your truth. I know that sounds really hippy-dippy, but if you look at her, how many times do you think she's probably heard, "You can't say that"? And I've heard, "You can't be that gay, you can't be that high-pitched, you'll never host a show with that voice." But what I've learned from her is to use what makes you different to stand out. I could've come to this town and taken hosting classes and done this and that and tried to lower my voice, but I would've looked like every other rock on the beach. The ones that work are those weirdlooking rocks. Those are the ones you notice.

When did you start to really love and embrace your voice?

There was a point in my teenhood when I realized that the voice wasn't changing. I was this gay cartoon of a person and it was a crossroad for me: I could either hate myself or I could love myself, and it's just not in my nature to hate, so I said, "Fine, I accept myself fully. Go 100 percent. Be you. Do you."

You talk about your Madonna encounter in your book. What's the trick to keeping it together when meeting Madge?

Clench your legs. Don't just, like, lose it. And if you're a huge fan, perhaps bring a diaper, because I have to tell you, that was so surreal. All I was thinking was, "Don't say something that makes her kick you out." I've shot pieces at zoos with animal keepers where they hand you a snake and you think, "This is exotic, this could bite me and this could kill me at any second." It felt the same way when I met Madonna.

There's already talk of a follow-up to your first book. Where might you take the second one?

The first book was about this person who loves pop culture and got plopped in the middle of it and tried to paddle and survive. I wanted to sort of establish who I was growing up, how I got plopped in pop culture and why that was such a big deal.

The next book is about what happens now. You achieved this dream; what's it like? I have a partner, we're starting a family, I'm trying to see the world and travel. Every day I live this crazy life and I think to myself, "You've gotta write this down." I mean, the fact that I'm sitting where I'm sitting and I walk by celebrities every day on this lot and amazing things happen, and I go to these celebrity houses and I just can't believe it. I am this superfan, but I get to be on the inside. I think that's a story people want to hear.



A Different Dev

'Like a G6' Singer On Androgyny, Lesbian Rumors & Upcoming Album

When dance-floor mainstay Dev first hit the scene with her minimalist, bassheavy, club-thumper "Booty Bounce" in 2010, she told the world, "I ain't yo average bitch." Some listened, but most didn't, disregarding Dev as just another pseudo-edgy, white girl rapper.

"It was my first album," she says emphatically. "The first time anyone had really every heard my voice was on (Far East Movement's) 'Like a G6.' From then on, everybody just sort of summed me up like that ... but I also like (being) vulnerable."

In just a year, "Booty Bounce" racked up 12 million views on YouTube, many of them from the gay community. Dev says she owes her early success to the LGBT scene in the San Francisco Bay Area. "It's been pretty much amazing having that support since day one. They still do (support me) and I appreciate it. Coming up in San Francisco and in the

Bay, that whole community took to me before anybody, so I put a lot of my heart into that community."

And now, at 10 p.m. Aug. 24, she'll perform for that community. Along with "RuPaul's Drag Race" alum Raja and Latrice Royale, Dev will appear during Ice-At-Large: The Epic Reunion Party at the Royal Oak Music Theater. But just because she's performing for a sea of queers, don't be fooled. Despite rumors, Dev isn't a lesbian.

"I just felt bad because when I had a baby, lesbian fans on Twitter were like, 'Wait a second, I thought you were a lesbian. This is bullshit.' And I was like, 'I'm sorry, I love you too, though!' she says, jokingly tearful. "It's actually really funny and cute. It didn't offend me at all. If anything, it's a compliment."

Although she'd never been linked to any specific woman, her androgynous style and aggressive lyrics led some people to make the erroneous logical

"Growing up, I was a big tomboy, pretty much up until I got boobs, then I was like, 'OK, I'm wearing a bra now," she recalls. "It's interesting – now that I'm an adult – I like carrying that over and also celebrating my feminine side. I like being strong and fierce but I also like being sweet. I love being able to pair my fiancé's clothes with mine and do a crazy haircut and also wear lipstick. It's so fun for me."

Her love of androgyny doesn't stop at herself; she also finds androgynous women to be beautiful and inspiring.

"Androgynous women are so beautiful, and I really look to them so

much for inspiration," she says proudly. "When Lady Gaga plays it up, I think it's beautiful. She's so fun."

But Dev is all about the men, especially the one she plans on marrying, skateboarder Jimmy Gorecki. While some would find the transition between jet-setting career and family difficult, for Dev, it's a matter of balance.

"I love being able to travel with my daughter or bring her to the studio or sit at home and watch 'Bubble Guppies' for 10 hours on repeat," she says. "But what's really cool is that I get to go and still be sexy and still be 24 and still get to celebrate. I want my daughter, one day, to feel just as powerful and sexy. I can have family time and I can also wear hot pants and it's fucking sick. That balance is awesome."

After a baby, fiancé, tour, a mixtape, a couple hit singles, a viral video hit and three years, Dev is a decidedly different woman than during the recording of her debut.

"I recorded the first album in 2011 when I was living in a loft with The Cataracs," she recalls. "My situation then was very different than it is now. A lot of growth and a lot of interesting stuff have happened this past year that's given me a lot to say, which is good. I definitely want it to still be quirky. I want it to also be a little bit grown. I want my music to grow as I grow."

She's in no hurry to release the product of that growth – and despite it being pretty much finished, she's tightlipped about its release. She is, however, quick to correct a rumor that the album will be called "IAMDEV."

"It's currently in the works," Dev says. "I've spent the last seven months writing and recording, meeting a bunch of new producers. I wanted to spend a good amount of time on it. I don't know where the 'IAMDEV' rumor started; it's probably not going to be called that."

Hear Me Out

The Civil Wars, Backstreet Boys



The Civil Wars, 'The Civil Wars'

Nitty-gritty details are few concerning the highly publicized drama between The Civil Wars twosome Joy Williams and John Paul White, but the fallout was at least intense enough to cause a tour cancellation, talk of a possible breakup and this album: a gothic-dark speculative set of neo-folk songs strewn with wounded hearts, religious undertones and the looming sense that this won't end well. And if it doesn't, if the only good that comes of their personal turmoil is this, then at least they can be remembered for breakup songs so good Adele is probably pissed they're not on her next album. "The One that Got Away" aptly turns that cliché on its head; swelling with red-hot intensity at the chorus and then closing with a cacophony of telling guitar rips, it emotes post-split bitterness and regret. Williams takes lead on most of the tunes, with White shadowing her vocals – they make harmonious heaven on said single - or stepping in to magnify the power of them. "Dust to Dust" is raw and gut-wrenching with just Williams alone, but that moodiness takes on a new, more sorrowful life when White tiptoes in; the same goes for "Eavesdrop," a beauty built on Coldplay-mounting guitars that eerily – and sadly – parallels the duo's personal lives: "Don't say that it's over / Oh no, say it ain't so." Because after this triumph, that would truly be devastating. *Grade: A-*



Backstreet Boys, 'In a World Like This'

Backstreet's back ... but is it really all right? It's not, unless you're still holding onto the

nostalgia of them as boys. Then, they could get away with a certain degree of cheese and artistic growing pains. But nearly two decades later, the original quintet - Kevin Richardson returns! are still all wink-wink with the same shameless set of lovey-dovey pop and fifth-grade-journal outpourings. The worst offenders are "One Phone Call," not even good enough to sound like a Lonely Island parody of the Backstreet Boys, and "Feels Like Home," which takes you around the world - namedropping just about every major city – on the dullest expedition of your life. The Max Martin-produced title track has charm (and its video celebrates marriage equality), but aside from the acoustic-y verses, this is the same bland boy-band template these guys have been hawking their whole career. "Breathe," however, is a harmony pleaser, and "Trust Me" – a Jason Mraz move that could benefit future outings – delights with its summery Starbucks vibe. Even "Soldier," despite being innocuously cookie-cutter, decently works those stacked percussions into an earwormy hook. Hey, it's the Backstreet Boys; no one's expecting miracles. *Grade: C*

Gregory Alan Isakov, 'The Weatherman'

It's easy to write off Gregory Alan Isakov's third full-length because of the

mellowness of these hammockswinging songs. But Isakov has another feather in his hat with this sumptuous set: "The Weatherman" is a truly stunning release on which the South African-born singer-songwriter eases into your conscious with little more than his thoughtful words ("If it weren't for second chances, we'd all be alone"), that dreamy voice and the magic of his melodies.




Vince Gill & Paul Franklin, 'Bakersfield'


Country king Vince Gill swings back to old-time twang for "Bakersfield,"



Performer Finds 'Other Voice' In Cancer Play

Anne Frank once said, "I don't think of all the misery but of the beauty that still remains." For Alex Kip, that quote couldn't ring more true.

Enter his autobiographical show, "My Other Voice," which makes its premiere Thursday, Aug. 15 at the University of Michigan's Arthur Miller Theatre, and you'll understand how he found the beauty in a situation when some would have only seen the bad.

After being diagnosed with non-Hodgkin's lymphoma two weeks before graduating with a Bachelor of Fine Arts in Musical Theatre from the University of Michigan, Kip would go on to lose not only his voice while getting treatment at the U-M Medical Center, but his identity as a performer.

"When I lost my voice, (writing) sort of became my new creative outlet in a sense," Kip said. "(The show) was allowing myself to explore whatever interested me and not judging it as far as I've never written a play before, and just seeing what happens."

Kip said the show covers an eight to nine month period and takes viewers from life before the diagnosis to him getting better and "everything that happens in-between."

His diagnosis in 2010, where he was given a 15-30 percent chance of survival, came as what Kip describes as a "relief in a weird way." After struggling vocally the entire year, the London Dramatic Academy graduate was finally able to identify what was going on.

Then in 2012, when he was "done with everything," Kip made the move to New York, where he was cast in a play Ari Laura Kreith was directing.

Kreith, who's the artistic director at Theatre 167 in New York and director of "My Other Voice," is primarily a new works director and works with medical students doing professional identity development, using theater as a tool to awaken their awareness.

While discussing this with Kip, it led to a conversation about collaborating between the first-time playwright and seasoned

"We had a moment of 'let's just go get coffee," Kreith said. "So we walk down and literally, neither of us can remember who said it first, but we both said, 'I think we should write a play."

Kip began writing and bringing in scenes - and the rest, as they say, is history.

Kreith said she had no idea what the project was going to be when it began, but as the piece evolved, she was "struck by the way that he (Kip) tells his story."

"It wasn't so much me taking a chance on a piece, but reaching out to a person and both of us discovering that it would

be something really meaningful and deserved to be explored," she said.

After readings in New York, the show staged a workshop in Columbus, Ohio, Kip's hometown, before coming to Ann Arbor for its premiere – and in a sense, an out-of-town tryout.

"I don't think much will change after this, but it's sort of our chance to really get to work at it a lot and really expose it to a lot of people and go from there," Kip said.

Kip's and Kreith's hopes for this show go much beyond seeing it perform off-Broadway or on Broadway, even though that is a hope. There are dreams to turn it into a film or TV series, a la HBO's "The Big C." But more importantly, the show is about getting people to discuss and ask questions about young adult cancer, which is the number one killer of young adults today.

Kip said that the young adult cancer movement is really starting to pick up, as there are a lot of questions people don't have answers to. He also said that there is a lot of controversy around it, leading to people really getting interested in the specific age group.

"I think (the show is) a way to expose the problem in the system and expose why maybe we aren't getting better or why people are dying, and to really look at it more intensely – but in an interesting way too," Kip said.

The way that the show addresses cancer is also being done in a way that won't make viewers think of a "movieof-the-week tearjerker," Kreith said. Something else they've heard a lot is how surprised people are by the humor in it.

"He's (Kip) someone who's always proven to seeing the hopeful and sometimes the absurd in the moment," she said. "I think that's one of the strengths of the play.

"It's interesting because people think about this play as the 'cancer play,' and it's really a play where cancer catalyzes change," Kreith said. "There's a larger sense where it's an identity play, and it's also a play about truly discovering what matters."
