What Is Mytesi?

Mytesi is a prescription medicine used to improve symptoms of noninfectious diarrhea (diarrhea not caused by a bacterial, viral, or parasitic infection) in adults living with HIV/AIDS on ART.

Do Not Take Mytesi if you have diarrhea caused by an infection. Before you start Mytesi, your doctor and you should make sure your diarrhea is not caused by an infection (such as bacteria, virus, or parasite).

Possible Side Effects of Mytesi Include:

- Upper respiratory tract infection (sinus, nose, and throat infection)
- Bronchitis (swelling in the tubes that carry air to and from your lungs)
- Cough
- · Flatulence (gas)
- Increased bilirubin (a waste product when red blood cells break down)

Should I Take Mytesi If I Am:

Pregnant or Planning to Become Pregnant?

A Nursing Mother?

- It is not known whether Mytesi is passed through human breast milk



#MuteRKelly Campaigns Against R. Kelly's Feb. 21 Detroit Concert

PROTEST

Cult leader, rapist and sexual predator. Whether sensationalized or fully accurate, having accusations like these swirl around one's career seem like they would destroy it. However, in the case of 51-year-old Rhythm and Blues artist R. Kelly, they barely seem to have made a dent. Born Robert Kelly, in his career, the singer has sold over 100 million albums, won multiple Grammy Awards and even created a well-received autobiography. Kelly managed to balance all this success with almost a dozen allegations — and one trial — since the 1990s, for illegal and inappropriate sexual conduct with both women and minors.

According to Liliana Reyes, a program director at the Ferndale-based LGBTQ community center Affirmations, that R. Kelly has experienced nearly uninterrupted success is deeply linked to society's perception of celebrities and women.

"Sometimes, people put public figures on a pedestal," Reyes said.

Reyes is also a supporter of the #MuteRKelly Detroit movement. The movement officially formed in December 2017, when its founders



realized that R. Kelly was scheduled for a sponsored performance by 105.9 Kiss-FM at Little Caesar's Arena, alongside singer Charlie Wilson. The show is on Feb. 21 as part of the "Tale of Two Kings Tour". The movement's aim is to cancel this show, or at least hold a protest event alongside it. This is all in an effort to make a statement supporting sexual

Nicole Denson, an activist and director of advocacy services at WC SAFE – a nonprofit dedicated to helping victims of sexual assault – was one of the main drivers in this.

"The #MeToo movement is everywhere, sexual harassment is really, really talked about, and has been in the forefront in the media. So, as a person who is in a marginalized community and serves marginalized communities, it really hit home for me that he is in our city," Denson said. "And so, I started on Facebook, a call to action, and quite a few people responded. This call to action was met by a lot of women of color, and a lot of women of color who also identify within the LGBT community - which I'm a part of."

Denson – who is openly bisexual and a survivor of sexual assault and violence herself – said that she aimed to form an proactive community that not only advocates for victims of sexual assault generally, but that is purposefully inclusive of all sexual orientations, gender identities, races and ethnicities

"I think a lot of people are afraid to talk about this issue. I believe it's really hard in our communities because of the fact that, because of my intersections, it's hard to understand what community speaks about my issues," Denson said. "When I stand behind Black Lives Matter, I sometimes feel as if they might not talk about that trans women's lives matter, or when I talk about or stand behind the LGBT (community), sometimes I feel like they don't talk about the marginalized."

Shortly after putting out her call to action, she made contact with Kenyette Barnes, the organizer of the national #MuteRKelly movement, which had a hand in cancelling several shows from the singer's most recent tour. This contact helped to structure the Detroit branch's organization. On its Facebook page, it outlines an eight-step process to both draw attention to sexual assault, and remove Kelly's scheduled performance. Denson said a structured, and measured approach is absolutely vital to gain support and be heard.

"We're very intentional about how we're going about this," Denson said. "It's taking time. Right now, we're reaching out by writing letters. This is business to them."

However, as serious as Denson is about this topic, she wants to make clear, she's not trying to judge his existing fans, she is trying to educate them on the seriousness of this topic.

"His sexual assault against a minor was videotaped. You have to understand that some of these allegations were not just allegations. Not only were they videotaped, but they settled out of court. So, you have to wonder, when he's 'stepping in the name of love,' who's love is he talking about? When you see these songs about sexual gratification, who is he talking about?" Denson said. "A lot of people say, 'Well, it's mostly black women who are supporting him,' and I have to say to them, 'That may be true, but this one isn't."

Denson said that R. Kelly's accusations have caused a rift with an impact similar to Bill Cosby's.

"It's OK. That's the thing we're trying to get across to people. It's OK to be upset. It's OK to say that R. Kelly made a good song. It's OK to be mad that you sang 'I Believe I Can Fly' in grade school," Denson said with a laugh. "It's OK to be mad about that, or that I watched 'The Cosby Show' and I'm mad because he was Cliff Huxtable."

However, Denson said that once the anger subsides, it becomes time to choose a side.

"You have to say, 'I have to sacrifice that I can't support this person, because I'm putting money into the hands of a pedophile or a rapist.' And, you have to separate that," she said.

Representatives for Little Caesar's Arena, 105.9 Kiss-FM and R. Kelly did not respond in time for the publication of this story.

Community Members to Protest 'Conversion Therapy' Workshop

Members of the community will hold a peaceful protest outside the Metro City Church Riverview Campus during the hours of what many are calling a conversion therapy workshop.

In a Facebook post that's since been taken down, Metro City Church advertised an "Unashamed Identity Workshop" for girls (by birth) ages 12-16 who are struggling with the thoughts that they are "Trans – Bi – Gay or other." The classes are scheduled to take place every Thursday at 6 p.m. from Feb. 8 – April 18.

The post sparked widespread backlash and a flurry of comments denouncing the church as anti-LGBTQ. The Metro-Detroit Political Action Network announced that it will be holding the protest at the church on Feb. 8 at 6 p.m. – the night of the first class.

MDPAN's Facebook page said, "We have had people sending multiple screenshots stating that this pastor did indeed call these sessions conversion therapy."

Conversion therapy is the pseudoscientific practice of trying to change an individual's sexual orientation using psychological or spiritual interventions, and is opposed by several psychological experts.

The post, which has since been taken down,

was flooded with disapproving comments.

MDPAN wrote: "This is a hate group. It's archaic and oppressive so we will show them that love is love. The protest is to be peaceful, inspiring and encouraging to the children forced to have these workshops. Protestors are encouraged to share their stories to the crowd."

Metro City Church's head pastor Jeremy Schossau has been contacted by BTL for comment. He did tell Fox 2 Detroit that "There's a lot of brokenness that leads to these major sexual decisions in life and we want to engage those. We do believe God has a direction for man, that he created men and women to love the opposite sex and to marry, and stay in a monogamous, lasting relationship. I understand the world has all kinds of other views, but that's what we believe. We are sexually traditionally-minded Christians."

The organizers ask that protesters park on side streets and be respectful in their actions. Protesters are encouraged to carry posters advertising "state resources, pride, and/or empowerment messages."

A 2017 report released by the Michigan State Housing Development Authority estimated that almost 66,500 people were homeless in Michigan from 2014. Although that's an improvement of 9 percent since 2014, there is still much work to be done. Of that number of homeless people, 13,812 were children in families, and 660 were unaccompanied minors

In order to combat this number and maintain the current positive trend, Affirmations is

partnering with Samaritas, Michigan's largest non-profit organization dedicated to serving children and families.

Interested families and people are invited to the free event, which has a suggested \$5 donation. The event will be on Feb. 28, from 6 to 8 p.m. and will be held at Affirmations LGBTQ Community Center at 290 W. 9 Mile Road, Ferndale.

What is TRUVADA for PrEP?

TRUVADA for PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis) is a prescription medicine that is used together with safer sex practices to help reduce the risk of getting HIV-1 through sex. This use is only for HIV-negative adults who are at high risk of getting HIV-1. To help determine your risk of getting HIV-1, talk openly with your healthcare provider about your sexual health.

Ask your healthcare provider if you have questions about how to prevent getting HIV. Always practice safer sex and use condoms to lower the chance of sexual contact with body fluids. Never reuse or share needles or other items that have body fluids on them.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

What is the most important information I should know about TRUVADA for PrEP?

Before taking TRUVADA for PrEP:

- You must be HIV-negative before you start taking TRUVADA for PrEP. You must
 get tested to make sure that you do not already have HIV-1. Do not take TRUVADA
 to reduce the risk of getting HIV-1 unless you are confirmed to be HIV-negative.
- Many HIV-1 tests can miss HIV-1 infection in a person who has recently become infected. If you have flu-like symptoms, you could have recently become infected with HIV-1. Tell your healthcare provider if you had a flu-like illness within the last month before starting or at any time while taking TRUVADA for PrEP. Symptoms of new HIV-1 infection include tiredness, fever, joint or muscle aches, headache, sore throat, vomiting, diarrhea, rash, night sweats, and/or enlarged lymph nodes in the neck or groin.

While taking TRUVADA for PrEP:

- You must continue to use safer sex practices. Just taking TRUVADA for PrEP may not keep you from getting HIV-1.
- You must stay HIV-negative to keep taking TRUVADA for PrEP:
 - Get tested for HIV-1 at least every 3 months.
 - If you think you were exposed to HIV-1, tell your healthcare provider right away.
- To further help reduce your risk of getting HIV-1:
 - Know your HIV status and the HIV status of your partners.
 - Get tested for other sexually transmitted infections. Other infections make it easier for HIV to infect you.
 - Get information and support to help reduce risky sexual behavior, such as having fewer sex partners.
 - Do not miss any doses of TRUVADA. Missing doses may increase your risk of getting HIV-1 infection.
- If you do become HIV-1 positive, you need more medicine than TRUVADA alone to treat HIV-1. TRUVADA by itself is not a complete treatment for HIV-1. If you have HIV-1 and take only TRUVADA, your HIV-1 may become harder to treat over time.

TRUVADA can cause serious side effects:

Worsening of hepatitis B (HBV) infection. TRUVADA is not approved to treat HBV.
 If you have HBV and stop taking TRUVADA, your HBV may suddenly get worse. Do not stop taking TRUVADA without first talking to your healthcare provider, as they will need to monitor your health.

Who should not take TRUVADA for PrEP?

Do not take TRUVADA for PrEP if you:

- Already have HIV-1 infection or if you do not know your HIV-1 status. If
 you are HIV-1 positive, you need to take other medicines with TRUVADA to treat
 HIV-1. TRUVADA by itself is not a complete treatment for HIV-1. If you have HIV-1
 and take only TRUVADA, your HIV-1 may become harder to treat over time.
- Also take certain medicines to treat hepatitis B infection.

What are the other possible side effects of TRUVADA for PrEP?

Serious side effects of TRUVADA may also include:

- Kidney problems, including kidney failure. Your healthcare provider may do blood tests to check your kidneys before and during treatment with TRUVADA.
 If you develop kidney problems, your healthcare provider may tell you to stop taking TRUVADA.
- Too much lactic acid in your blood (lactic acidosis), which is a serious but rare medical emergency that can lead to death. Tell your healthcare provider right away if you get these symptoms: weakness or being more tired than usual, unusual muscle pain, being short of breath or fast breathing, stomach pain with nausea and vomiting, cold or blue hands and feet, feel dizzy or lightheaded, or a fast or abnormal heartbeat.
- Severe liver problems, which in rare cases can lead to death. Tell your
 healthcare provider right away if you get these symptoms: skin or the white part
 of your eyes turns yellow, dark "tea-colored" urine, light-colored stools, loss of
 appetite for several days or longer, nausea, or stomach-area pain.
- Bone problems, including bone pain, softening, or thinning, which may lead to fractures. Your healthcare provider may do tests to check your bones.


Common side effects in people taking TRUVADA for PrEP are stomach-area (abdomen) pain, headache, and decreased weight. Tell your healthcare provider if you have any side effects that bother you or do not go away.

What should I tell my healthcare provider before taking TRUVADA for PrEP?

- All your health problems. Be sure to tell your healthcare provider if you have or have had any kidney, bone, or liver problems, including hepatitis.
- If you are pregnant or plan to become pregnant. It is not known if TRUVADA can harm your unborn baby. If you become pregnant while taking TRUVADA for PrEP, talk to your healthcare provider to decide if you should keep taking TRUVADA.
- If you are breastfeeding (nursing) or plan to breastfeed. Do not breastfeed. If you become HIV-positive, HIV can be passed to the baby in breast milk.
- All the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. TRUVADA may interact with other medicines. Keep a list of all your medicines and show it to your healthcare provider and pharmacist when you get a new medicine.
- If you take certain other medicines with TRUVADA, your healthcare provider may need to check you more often or change your dose. These medicines include certain medicines to treat hepatitis C (HCV) infection.

 To help determine your risk of getting HIV-1, talk openly with your healthcare provider about your sexual health.

Do NOT take TRUVADA for PrEP if you:

- . Already have HIV-1 infection or if you do not know your HIV-1 status.
- Take certain medicines to treat hepatitis B infection.

HOW TO TAKE TRUVADA FOR PrEP

- Take 1 tablet once a day, every day, not just when you think you have been exposed to HIV-1.
- Do not miss any doses. Missing doses may increase your risk of getting HIV-1 infection.
- Use TRUVADA for PrEP together with condoms and safer sex practices.
- Get tested for HIV-1 at least every 3 months. You must stay HIV-negative to keep taking TRUVADA for PrEP.

NEW YORK – SAGE, the nation's largest and oldest organization dedicated to improving

the lives of LGBT elders, announced Jan. 5 that Jim Obergefell is joining its Board of Directors. Obergefell is the named plaintiff in the landmark Supreme Court case Obergefell v. Hodges that brought marriage equality to the U.S. in 2015.

"We are deeply honored to add Jim's expertise and energy to our board," said Michael Adams, SAGE's CEO. "Having accompanied Jim and our beloved friend Edie Windsor on a groundbreaking journey toward marriage equality, we continue to be awed by Jim's unwavering commitment and outspoken voice in support of the entire LGBT community."

Elizabeth F. Schwartz, SAGE board cochair, added to Adams' statement.

"The LGBT movement has achieved great change by telling our stories. Jim Obergefell shared the painful passing of his husband, and his fight to be recognized as a spouse brought us marriage equality. Jim's decision to bring his big heart and sharp mind to SAGE's board speaks volumes about his continuing work toward equality for our most vulnerable community."

Obergefell said that he is thrilled to accept the position.

"I'm excited to serve on the board of an organization that does so much to help those who paved the way for younger LGBTO generations. Our elders' courage and sacrifices helped create a more supportive and welcoming world for us, and SAGE fights to ensure that they are able to enjoy the same. It's an honor to work with SAGE on their behalf."

Obergefell and husband John Arthur launched their marriage equality legal battle with the state of Ohio in 2013, demanding recognition of their lawful marriage - they had wed in Maryland - on Arthur's impending death certificate. Arthur died of ALS three months after their first court hearing, and Obergefell continued their fight all the way to the Supreme Court.

After careers in teaching, training, IT consulting and real estate, Obergefell is now a fulltime LGBT activist, speaker and author, as well as an entrepreneur. He is the co-founder of Equality Vines, the first cause-based wine label, which supports organizations devoted to civil rights and equality.

He also co-wrote the book "Love Wins"" with Debbie Cenziper, a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist with the Washington Post. The book, published by William Morrow/Harper Collins, shares the stories of the lovers and lawyers who participated in the historic Supreme Court case. Temple Hill Productions/Fox 2000 Pictures bought the movie rights for the book and will produce a feature film based on it.

In addition to his SAGE Board of Directors role, Obergefell is a member of the National Advisory Board for the GLBT Historical Society and the Board of Advisors for the Mattachine Society of Washington, D.C.

Since the Supreme Court ruling, Obergefell, who resides in Washington, D.C., has been honored with awards from organizations such as Equality Florida, Equality North Carolina, the ACLU of Southern California and more. Foreign Policy magazine named Obergefell one of its 2015 Global Thinkers, and Out magazine named him to its 2015 Out 100 list.

Por over 50 years, Life magazine informed Americans about current events both in the U.S. and abroad. Photos and content were dramatic – mostly conservative, occasionally controversial and, sometimes, downright shocking.

Life folded in 1973. Circulation was clocked at 13 million. Readership, 10 times that amount. Its sister publication, Time, marches on to this day.

Five years before the Stonewall Riots of 1969, Life tackled a scary taboo: "Homosexualities in America." An expose focusing on the gay underworld. New York! Chicago! San Francisco! America's collective Sodom and Gomorrahs.

(Detroit's gay scene in the '60s included – in walking distance of City Hall and the 1st Precinct Police Headquarters – The 1011, La Rosa's, Silver Dollar, Foster's and Palais Bar – a lesbian hangout.)

Naive Middle Americans woke up to the realization that homos were growing in number, becoming alarmingly visible and a social threat to be somehow remedied.

In 1964, San Francisco was not the dynamic gay center of Castro/Market Street, clone-look militancy. It hadn't the high-density population complex of the 1970s and pre-AIDS 1980s; but Life's wide-audience article – unintentionally, to be sure – served as a catalyst for early gay migration there. (And rent was cheaper then.)

Life opened its scare head on: "Homosexuality shears across the spectrum of American life: the professional, the arts, business and labor. It always has. But today, especially in big cities, homosexuals are discarding their furtive ways and openly admitting, even flaunting, their deviation.

"Homosexuals have their own drinking places, their special assignation streets, even their own organizations. And for every obvious homosexual, there are probably nine nearly impossible to detect.

"This social disorder, which society tries to suppress, has forced itself into the public eye because it does present a problem – and parents especially are concerned.


"The myth and misconception with which homosexuality has so long been clothed must be cleared away, not to condone it but to cope with it."

Accompanying the 14-page belly shock are a dozen photos. Nameless gay men clustered in dark bars or milling about on dimly lighted streets.


"These brawny young men in their leather caps, shirts, jackets and pants are practicing homosexuals, men who turn to other men for affection and sexual satisfaction," it read. "They are part of what they call the 'gay world,' which is actually a sad and often sordid world."


Gay bars are exposed: "As each new customer walks into the dimly lit room, he will lock eyes with a half dozen young men before reaching his place at the bar. Throughout the evening there is a constant turnover of customers as contacts are made and two

I hear that shit burns. Ouch!

"It used to be not being able to have sex with hot HIV-negative guys but thankfully, undetectable and PrEP has changed that."

Well, look at Alex sharing this shit! It was supposed to be a list of downers - here he IS bragging!

So what's mine?

It's always been the worst part of living with HIV to me – diarrhea! As a gay man, that shit (no pun intended) used to stop me from having sex. And I'm not alone in this. Others living with HIV share this with me. I know, because I talk a lot about diarrhea.

According to a recent survey of people living with HIV, 27 percent currently have diarrhea, while 56 percent have had diarrhea in the past and 61 percent of those with diarrhea reported having it for more than five years. And, 30 percent of those currently experiencing diarrhea said they never discussed diarrhea with their doctor and/or reported feeling that the doctor dismissed or "blew off" their issue with diarrhea.

But, luckily for me, I decided to talk to my medical team (yes, my team - from the receptionist to the physician and the lab techs ... even the valet at the doctor's office, are all a part of my medical team) about the only FDA approved treatment available for people living with HIV that experience diarrhea – Mytesi.

And I LOVE being able to honestly say: it worked for me, just like the data in the trials proved.

So, what about you? What would make your lovely "Shit List" this Valentine's Day?

LAAD's 2018 Accelerating Acceptance report is out and the results are a bit disappointing. For four years, GLAAD has commissioned



a survey of American acceptance and attitudes toward **LBGTQ** Americans, seeing annual gains. For the first time, support is shrinking.

Marriage Opponent Wins First Round of Costa Rica Presidential Election

A vocal opponent of marriage rights for same-sex couples has won the first round of Costa Rica's presidential election.

The New York Times reported Fabricio Alvarado of the National Restoration Party received nearly 25 percent of the vote on Sunday. Alvarado, a Pentecostal minister and singer who is a former journalist, will face off against Carlos Alvarado of the leftist Citizen's Action Party in the second round that will take place on April 1.

Fabricio Alvarado and Carlos Alvarado will face off against each other because neither of them received at least 40 percent of the vote on Sunday.

Sunday's election took place less than a month after the Inter-American Court of Human Rights issued a landmark ruling that recognized same-sex marriage and transgender rights.

Costa Rican Vice President Ana Helena Chacón on Jan. 9 announced her country's government will comply with the ruling. The New York Times reported Fabricio Alvarado defeated 12 other candidates in the first round because he made his opposition to the decision a centerpiece of his campaign.

Margarita Salas, a Costa Rican LGBT rights advocate who is a candidate for the country's National Assembly, on Monday described the election results as "a very difficult scenario."

"The country's anti-rights forces came together," she told the Washington Blade. "These results are undoubtedly a blow to the advance of human rights."

Costa Rica is a predominantly Roman Catholic country that borders Nicaragua and Panama, but more of its residents have become evangelical Christians in recent years. Chacón acknowledged to the Washington Blade last November during an interview in the Costa Rican capital of San José that anti-LGBT attitudes remain a "big challenge" in the country, in spite of her government's efforts to combat them.

Report: Not Even Half of LGBT People Say Workplace Offers FMLA

Rewer than 50 percent of LGBT people say they have access in their workplace to benefits under the Family & Medical Leave Act, according to a new report by the Human Rights Campaign Foundation.

The findings came about as the result of the organization's 2018 U.S. LGBTQ Paid Leave Survey. The survey, completed by more than 5,400 LGBTQ people from across the nation, found only 45 percent of respondents say their employer extends leave policies — paid or unpaid — that include LGBT people.

Mary Beth Maxwell, the Human Rights Campaign's senior vice president for programs, research and training, said the report should serve as a wakeup call.

"No one should have to choose between who they are, the people they love and the job they need," Maxwell said. "As the only developed nation in the world without some form of guaranteed paid leave policy, American workers, including LGBTQ employees, are too often forced to either forgo their income or leave their job entirely to treat an illness, care for a loved one, or grow their family."

The report comes on the 25th anniversary of the Family & Medical Leave Act, a federal law signed by President Bill Clinton affording employees up to 12 weeks of unpaid, jobprotected leave per year for family and medical reasons.

The Labor Department first established

married same-sex couples have access to benefits under the Family & Medical Leave Act after the U.S. Supreme Court in 2013 struck down the antigay Defense of Marriage Act, which barred federal recognition of same-sex marriage. Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton sought to block those benefits to gay couples in states without marriage equality and succeeded in trial court, but that ruling was overturned by the 2015 Supreme Court decision for marriage equality nationwide.

Among the key findings the Human Rights Campaign pulled from its survey.

Fewer than half of respondents report that their employer's policies cover new parents of all genders equally;

Only 49 percent say that employer policies are equally inclusive of the many ways families can welcome a child, including childbirth, adoption, or foster care;

One in five respondents report that they would be afraid to request time off to care for a loved one because it might disclose their LGBTQ identity, illustrating the need for explicit federal LGBTQ-inclusive non-discrimination protections;

And 48 percent of respondents, reflecting the prevalence of family rejection within the LGBTQ community, indicated that they feel an increased responsibility to care for loved ones whose own families have rejected them

President Trump has proposed instituting paid family leave by

extending unemployment insurance benefits to working parents whose employers do not offer paid maternity leave. But the plan – a pet cause of Ivanka Trump – faces an uphill battle in the Republican Congress, and critics contend unemployment checks under Trump's plan are skimpy and won't provide sufficient compensation.

Another finding in the report: 92 percent of LGBT respondents in the survey say the United States should guarantee paid leave to all Americans, and another 92 percent say access to paid leave would positively affect their lives.

RNC Approves Resolution Backing Trump's Transgender Military Ban

The Republican National Committee has approved a resolution in favor of President Trump's effort to ban transgender people from the U.S. military, according to the Associated Press.

The RNC approved the resolution Friday at its annual winter meeting, which this year is taking place in West Virginia. Trump delivered remarks at the event this week before departing for Mar-a-Lago for the weekend.

According to the Associated Press, the RNC voted to support Trump's directive instructing the military to consider being transgender "a disqualifying psychological and physical" condition.

The resolution reportedly says the RNC supports Trump's "intent and prerogative to strengthen our military with sound personnel policies," but also urges the Justice Department to seek U.S. Supreme Court action.

According to the AP, it's a common practice for the RNC to pass resolutions supporting the president's policy, especially what that policy is challenged in court. There was no public debate on the measure during the RNC's general session Friday, the AP reported.

Lucas Acosta, director of LGBTQ media for the Democratic National Committee, said approval of the resolution was par for the course for Republicans and the Trump White House

"Over the last month alone, the Trump-Pence administration has rolled back significant protections for the LGBTQ community, ripped apart families and allowed health care workers to discriminate access to medical care," Acosta said. "Today, the RNC decided to go even further and pass a hateful resolution, which only serves to subvert and further demean hardworking men and women who want to serve their country in the most honorable way they can."

After Trump first announced via Twitter in June he would ban transgender people from the military "in any capacity," he followed that up with a directive to the Pentagon barring them from service or enlistment and denying payment for troops who need gender reassignment surgery.

But as a result of multiple court orders following litigation from LGBT

groups, Trump's transgender ban was put on hold.

Nonetheless, the Pentagon is still expected to produce a report for Trump on transgender military service. As outlined in Trump's directive, a panel will present recommendations by the end of February to Defense Secretary James Mattis, who will then advise Trump for new policy on March 23.

LGBT groups harangued the RNC for approving a resolution, calling it an attack on members of the U.S. armed forces

Mara Keisling, executive director for the National Center for Transgender Equality, said in a statement the only disruption the military endured as a result of transgender people was Trump's attempt to remove them.

"The fact is that we've shown, both through studies and experience, that open service by transgender troops is good for the military," Keisling said. "We look forward to the courts settling this once and for all so that transgender troops can focus on protecting our country without having to worry about their job security every day."

Sarah Kate Ellis, CEO of GLAAD, said in a statement the RNC's approval of the resolution demonstrates the impact of Trump's anti-LGBT policy.

"President Trump's bigoted proposal to purge qualified military personnel is in direct contradiction to the will of the American people and what's best for our nation's security," Ellis said. "The fact that the RNC is siding with blatant discrimination over supporting the rights of brave Americans to serve our nation displays how toxic and deeply rooted the Trump Administration's anti-LGBTQ ideology has become."

Ashley Braodway-Mack, president of the American Military Partner Association, gave no quarter in her assessment of the RNC resolution.

"Shame on the Republican National Committee for slandering the brave transgender men and women who serve our nation," Broadway-Mack said. "Not only did the RNC just degrade active duty service members, but they also maligned countless military families across the country with family members who also happen to be transgender. This is a disgusting, vile attempt to play politics with the lives of our military families."

Sen. Gillibrand: Defeat Trump in 2020 to Pass Equality Act

en. Kirsten Gillibrand (D-N.Y.) called Saturday night for the defeat of President Trump in Election 2020 and a change of Congress to enact long-sought after federal non-discrimination protections for LGBT people.

Gillibrand, a possible Democratic contender in 2020, made the remarks Saturday at the 2018 HRC Greater New York Gala, encouraging attendees to join efforts to make change in the mid-term election and the presidential election in 2020.

"We know this president will never sign the Equality Act to ensure the civil rights of LGBTQ Americans,"

Gillibrand said. "He has neither the decency, nor the empathy to do so. But even with him in the Oval Office, we can make progress, because with a Democratic in the House and the Senate, we can the momentum that we need for a new president to sign that bipartisan bill in 2020."

The Equality Act, legislation introduced by Rep. David Cicilline (D-R.I.) and Jeff Merkley (D-Ore.), would amend the Civil Rights Act of 1964 to prohibit anti-LGBT discrimination in employment, housing, public accommodations, education, credit, jury service and federal funding.

In a 2000 interview with The Advocate, Trump said he supports amending the Civil Rights Act to include sexual orientation, but he has never addressed the issue during his 2016 campaign or as president, nor has he ever said whether he backs the addition of transgender protections in federal law. The erosion of LGBT rights during the first year of his administration suggest Trump no longer holds the position he expressed in 2000.

Gillibrand also talked about her efforts in the 2010 repeal of "Don't Ask, Don't Tell," calling it "a landmark moment for LGBT rights in this nation" and "one of the proudest moments of my career."

"That experience was a turning point, too, because it taught me a fundamental lesson that I will never forget," Gillibrand told attendees. "Washington only acts when courageous people, people like all of you in this room stand up and demand it."

Gillibrand attributed the success of the LGBT movement not to politicians, but activists on the ground, at one point referencing in particular the president of the Human Rights Campaign.

"Even if I am the one on the stage tonight, I want to remind all of you that the fight we have on our hands is only won because of the Chad Griffins and the Scott Campbells of this world and all of the people who here tonight who are determined to their faces heard," Gillibrand said.

As Trump's policies continue to have impact on minority groups across the board, Gillibrand's

speech wasn't just limited to LGBT rights

With pending a March 8 deadline to come to a solution before DREAMers may be deported from the United States, Gillibrand pointed out estimated 75,000 are LGBT and said "they face being sent back to countries with no protections for them, and President Trump and congressional Republicans are not doing nearly enough to stop it."

At one point, Gillibrand became audibly emotional when she recalled the story of a transgender kid who goes to the same school as her son and found the support of his classmates.

"I watched a young men build his courage over many years – first with blue hair, then a short hair cut and, finally, a new name – to stand before his school at graduation and to find his present and his future on his own terms," Gillibrand said. "I couldn't have been prouder even if he was my own son."

But Gillibrand's tone quickly changed when she juxtaposed that story with the Trump's attempt to ban transgender people from the U.S. military.

"When President Trump looks at our transgender troops as valueless and when his party tries to demonize this boy and every other like him, this arrogance and bigotry will provoke a fury in me that will not subside," Gillibrand said.

Referencing legislation she introduced with Sen. John McCain (R-Ariz.) against Trump's ban, Gillibrand said not until the bill is passed "will we stop fighting to protect these transgender troops."

"So we have come far, but everyone in this room knows we are at the start of a journey towards making America a fair and more equal place for LGBTQ Americans, and it will not be easy, so brace yourselves for the battle ahead," Gillibrand said.

Also speaking at the 2018 HRC Greater New York Gala were New York Gov. Andrew Cuomo and Senate Minority Leader Charles Schumer (D-N.Y.).

Speaking with Candidate Robert Van Kirk

"A better Michigan starts with you." That's the campaign slogan for Robert Van Kirk, who is running for 77th State House District currently held by Republican Rep. Tommy Brann. A major part of his platform is standing up to oppression in any form and balance the scales. Much of his recent years have even included anti-bullying workshops and talks about what the residents can do to stop

bullying in their areas. However, much of this mentality and drive to protect "the little guy" started when Van Kirk was in high school. "I was very active when I was very young," Van Kirk said, "both in politics and in helping my community."

That's when he focused on LGBT activism, founding a prom in Michigan for high school students regardless of sexual orientation and gender identity. It was held

at the Grand Ledge Opera House, and he managed to raise over \$10,000 dollars for it, joining together several LGBT alliances over the project.

"What was rewarding for me was seeing people who normally couldn't go to the prom have this experience with their significant other or as their gender identity. People were coming up from Indiana even to attend this prom," he said. "This was really moving."

At Michigan State University, Van Kirk participated heavily in student government. One major issue he combatted was when the university tried to distribute funding for events off campus, even at the risk of many diversity organizations. Still, he worked to found an LGBT ministry on campus, now an acumenical Christian ministry.


"In grad school," Van Kirk said, "I became part of the Council of Grad Students. The university was stressing we'd have to raise the cost of the health care, and we had some issues with that, so we had to fight it. The exec board all wanted jobs in college administration, so they were very compliant with the university's demands. So in the next election, we voted them all out so we had people representing students. This was the first student government that entirely went against the demands of the college," Van Kirk said. "The university was taking advantage of grad students continuously. There were points where it was so blatant and flagrant. They eventually sent a representative to explain why they were taking down graduate housing on campus, sharing how wonderful the new places would be, how the grounds will be gorgeous, and they said, 'The cost will be whatever the market will bear."

However, Van Kirk also wants to fight that kind of systematic bullying at the state level, working on budget adjustment and fixing college affordability.

"The state has shirked its responsibility to provide affordable education," Van Kirk said. "The arc of my story is I get really pissed when someone big and powerful picks on and screws with someone less powerful. I've seen

> it in my working career as a manager in retail, and I've seen it in my education, my grad work, my undergrad, and my high school."

> Regarding more national affairs, Van Kirk is hopeful for the future of LGBT representation. "We saw the first trans person elected to the state legislature in the history of the U.S. It's a big policy change. She beat a conservative incumbent. Not only was the first trans person elected, but they beat a Republican incumbent who fought against her right to survive."



"By focusing on the issues people need to survive, sometimes you end up winning,"

Regarding ways to help, Van Kirk promotes awareness. Being vocal about issues you care about can even shape the actions of larger institutions.

"A big thing is I'm not getting - and candidates like me are not getting - a lot of money from the traditional institutions of the Democratic party. The party is providing their thoughts and prayers. That's all they're offering. The state house PACs aren't going to give any money. They're going to focus on areas that are more democratic. A big part of our campaign is small-dollar fundraiser," Van Kirk said. "Give to candidates like that, grassroots people running for office because the wheels of the political system are not turning for us."

And building off that, Van Kirk encourages people to vote for the everyday citizen if they're tired of politics.

"Another thing they can do is host house parties. Another thing is helping us to doorknock and actually campaign events," Van Kirk said. "You can attend phone banking events. It is your government.

Do you have any advice for someone approaching a polyamorous relationship for the first time?

Communication, patience and more communication. I would tell them to make sure that their foundation is secure before venturing out to add more partners. I would tell them to think of their wants and needs and expectations (and have their partner do it too) and then come together to talk about all of that. Something as simple as a difference in definition, can cause a lot of turmoil and misunderstandings. I would tell someone to be honest with themselves. To be selfish and think of themselves. Going along with their partners wants of an open relationship will do no one any favors.

How do you make time for more than one relationship?

An honest evaluation of your time and resources. I am happy and content with where I'm at in terms of relationships, but that doesn't mean that I don't have time I could be giving to someone else. I am very choosy about who I give that time to. Communication does wonders. As does compromising. A person would need to compromise with their current partner(s) along with any new or future ones to make sure that everyone feels like their needs are met and that no one feels that something is missing or lacking.



Phil Chase

What is your motivation for wanting a polyamorous relationship?

I think my motivation is roughly the same as it would be if I were monogamous, but polyamory allows me a special degree in which to exercise that motivation. I have always called myself an "explorer"there is something about the human condition, the way that

we look to each other and within ourselves to answer questions, that pulls at me. Exploring relationships with others within the context of ethical and consensual non-monogamy provides opportunities to treasure that connection with other people, and therefore build meaning into life.

What is the future of polyamory?

To me, polyamory is already something that is widely practiced; it just may not be in the mainstream of society just yet. I believe it has already been downgraded from "scandalous" to something seen as innocuous. Most reactions I have gotten have not been negative; they have been "hey, great for you if that's what you want to do, but it's not for me." Judging from this, and other stories I see in the media or in my daily life, I would estimate that we are 20-30 years from some kind of governmental or official recognition of polyamory as a legal entity. That might seem like a long time, but I think this reflects a natural pace of society and the natural tension we have from opposing perspectives, out of which true change can take place.

The other morning I was standing in the checkout lane behind a man who was buying two Valentine's Day cards, each curiously turned faced down. The checkout clerk proclaimed "What a gentleman!" Jokingly, I added "Yeah he's double the gentleman, buying two cards for a couple of very special people." Quickly the man added "Well I have a daughter as well as a wife," not wanting to imply any further romantic connections.

After his strong assertion of monogamy, I felt moved to say "Not that there's anything wrong with having more than one partner. I'm polyamorous and have multiple Valentines." Blank stares from the clerk and the customer. And a reassertion from the man that he's buying a card for his daughter. I sometimes enjoy flashing my polyamorous identity, even more so during a holiday steeped in monogamy.

First, let me break it down. I have been legally married to Phillip for nearly a quarter century. We live in a big, lovefilled house with Phillip's girlfriend, whom I consider a kind of sister-wife. Together we are raising our two teenage sons alongside her teenage boy and 8-year-old girl. I am also partnered with Doug, who is married to Niki. They do a normal part of my sexual expression. not live with us, but Doug resides here scheduled nights of the week and his twins often join us at family gatherings. We consider ourselves chosen family.

People tend to view that which is foreign to them through an oversexualized lens, thereby turning the exotic into the erotic. It happens to marginalized groups who identify as LGBTQ, and it happens to polyamorists as well. Our polycule (that's how we refer to our family grouping) had intercourse until late last night. Oh you think it was a wild orgy? Think again. We don't all smoosh in a love pile over here. We were doing what polys do best: talking. One could argue that polyamorists have honed expert skills in intercourse, both verbal and physical. Keeping desire aflame, celebrating your body and those of your partners in all stages of life, communicating about what really matters – it's intense.

The Polycule

Polyamory is about sex, and it's not. There are times when I hate having to painstakingly explain the sexual dynamic of our polycule, especially to those who have no idea whatsoever how to even begin to process what I take as

Polyamorous people don't have sex with everything that moves. We are, generally speaking, some of the most sexually responsible beings on this planet. I'm not a sex-crazed maniac, nor do my multiple connections mean I'm not "getting enough" from my husband. Being different doesn't make me an oddity.

My polyamorous life frequently blurs lines, just as it does for those in the alphabet soup of LGBTQ. How often have you questioned what to say on medical forms or other documents? Do the boxes that mark you as male or female seem limiting? How about the part that requires you to answer as single, married, divorced or widowed? Most of the time I can't for the life of me understand why my doctor or other professionals need to know my marital status, and I find myself frantically scribbling notes in the margins about my other significant connections.

What kinds of conversational topics seem "safe" when you meet someone for the first time? Polyamorists have many of the same issues with labels as those who wave the rainbow flag. Small talk inevitably turns toward the family dynamic, and who is connected to whom. This is when I start to get a little wiggly

in my seat. If I use the word "husband" too many times, the title starts to taste funny in my mouth. It's not that I am not proud of my legally married spouse - I most certainly am. It's that I'm part of a larger system that holds just as much importance for me. When talking to strangers, if I use other words like "partner," "wife," "boyfriend," or "girlfriend," I feel like I suddenly have to explain whole chunks of my world that I don't always feel up to exposing.

Ethical Non-Monogamy

Polyamory has been described as consensual, ethical, responsible non-monogamy. Lying, cheating and hypocrisy most certainly don't fit in to the schema. If polyamory were more accepted in mainstream culture, if it could hold couples together better by allowing each individual freedom to explore, would family structures improve? How many marriages have ended because a spouse cheated? If, instead, open, honest communication lead to deeper bonds, could children see that loving someone else doesn't blow the world apart? That's how things have worked for us.

Tell me something: if a young girl knows the difference between polyamory and cheating, why can't society see it, too? Rachael's daughter tells all her friends about her polyamorous family. When one of them exclaimed "That's cheating!" she replied "No it isn't. My mom and Phil's wife are friends on Facebook." Which, of course, makes it all legit.

Studies are being done to identify a gene that predisposes one to desire more than one sexual partner. Unfortunately, it's been referred to as the cheaters' gene. One needs to only look to the animal kingdom to find that few species are completely monogamous. Hopefully, as more people practice polyamory openly rather than having multiple partners behind their primary's back, more interest in further research will be generated and the gene will be named something that doesn't imply dishonesty.

Is it nature or nurture that shapes us as polyamorous? We may never know for certain. Here's something I believe in

Do, or should, children know about their parents' polyamory lovestyle? Discuss why or why not.

All our children do know and in general I feel that children should know for several different reasons. By hiding the fact that you have another person in your life you are creating a sense of shame about having that person in



your life. If your kids see you love your nesting partner, why is it wrong for them to see you love another partner. Love isn't wrong and I feel that hiding this says otherwise. It's also important for your partners to feel like they're not secrets or things we need to lie about. And what if the kids begin to suspect or figure out what's really going on? They might lose a lot of trust in you and question the world view you put out ... kids are smart and probably see a great deal more than you think. I know a lot of people in the community don't tell their kids. That's understandable, they worry about what kind of information about them gets out to employers teachers, etc. Also it's a difficult topic to broach with them, but I've always felt it was worth it in the long run. My children now have a new set of "poly" siblings that they can hang out with and learn from and they too know that there are other options for themselves other than what society puts forth.









What kinds of sexual and/or gender themes or messages do you hope come across during your shows?

I think one of the larger themes of the show revolves around the idea that everyone wants to be seen, whether it's on the cover of Vogue or the cover of Inches Magazine. Social media has so dramatically changed not only the way our culture looks at "celebrity" but also how one achieves that celebrity status. The other central theme of "Porn to be a Star" then becomes what does it mean to

achieve that celebrity status if it means anything at all? That all said, I wrote "Porn to be a Star" because I wanted to talk about the sex industry in a way that didn't demonize porn and especially victimize its performers. I think there are plenty of narratives already that give audiences the impression that porn will ruin your life (Boogie Nights, etc). Culturally we're led to believe that sex equals guilt. I wanted to enforce the idea that it's possible to enjoy one's sexuality – even monetize it - and still live a full life

Do you have a kind of ... behindthe-scenes story for us? Anything that most of your fans would be surprised to hear or would laugh at hearing?

One of the funniest memories I have from doing porn was a scene I shot with Kink.com a few years ago. I played an FBI agent in pursuit of an escaped convict (Wolf

Hudson) who then manages to turn the tables and capture me with my own handcuffs. You can imagine how the rest played, or, you know, Google it. The crazy part is that we filmed the entire thing on top of an old monastery that was reconverted into a hippie artist commune - did I mention this was San Francisco? Then while we were filming the scene I happened to look to my left and see a bunch of construction workers just chilling out on the roof across from us eating their lunch and watching the scene play out. It was very Village People meets porn meets religious awakening.

Tea and Coffee Week Combats 'Corporate Coffee Culture'

t kicked off in 2015 as just Tea Week, rebranded itself to Tea and Kombucha week and now, in its third iteration, its founder Eli Majid thinks it's finally where it should be as Michigan Tea and Coffee Week, from Feb. 11 to 18.

"But it has Kombucha as well," Said Majid. "I think the main focus was really to combat corporate coffee culture, that's what I'm calling it. We're an independent tea shop and supply coffee shops, we work with kombucha brewers and we're all pretty much on the same wavelength. So, this was kind of our pushback to show Michigan what else there is besides Starbucks and Tim Horton's and Biggby."

Majid is the owner of Eli Tea Bar, located in Birmingham. The shop will host many of the events that the week will bring, and he said he hopes to flip the perception of what most Michigander's view as "normal" on its head.

"We have a Kombucha 101, and we have a Thirs-Tea Wednesday that we're launching. It's kind of a 12-tea tasting of all the weird and funky stuff. We're half sold out for that right now, but we still have a few days until the coffee week," Majid said. "Drifter Coffee will be doing a takeover here. She has a coffee caboose that she normally travels around Michigan with, but she's taking over our shop for four hours and bringing coffee, pour-overs, different flights and all that."

The week will also allow Eli Tea Bar to

debut some of its newest creations.


"We're also launching a bunch of stuff, some of our new spring teas, plus we're launching cheese tea, which I think is going to be a very big deal," Majid said. "It's essentially an iced tea, like iced black tea with whipped up, liquid cheesecake floating on top. It's very big in Singapore, Hong Kong, etc. and we'll probably be the first ones here. The only other places that offer it — there's one shop in New York and one in LA — so we're keeping that under tight wraps until we throw it out there. I think it'll have a big following."

But Eli Tea Bar will only be hosting a fraction of the week's events. All over Metro Detroit, Tea and Coffee Week attendees can register for a variety of tea, coffee or kombucha-related events — and interest is high.

"The events are modeled after a restaurant week, which means all the independent shops are hosting their own events. The Aphro-Tea-Siac, that's an interesting one," Majid said. "It's hosted by intu tea, she has been selling at Eastern Market and Saturday markets for over 20 years, and now every single Valentine's Day event which is completely sold out. They even had a second seating and the second seating sold out as well."

Still, even though some events are sold out, the week has over 20 to choose from.




