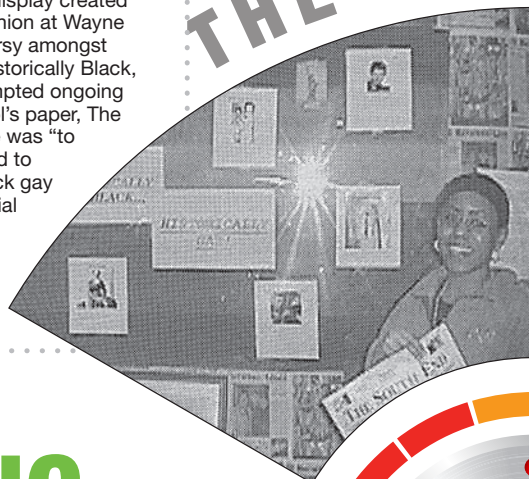

# THE '00S - 2003

**February - LGBT Black History Exhibit at WSU Raises Questions:** A one-week display created by the LGBT Students of Color Union at Wayne State University caused controversy amongst students on campus. Entitled "Historically Black, Historically Gay," the exhibit prompted ongoing articles and dialogue in the school's paper, The South End. The display's purpose was "to show pride for LGBT students and to demonstrate the existence of black gay people - that they overcame social barriers."



**March - March Decries Trans Killings:** Two dozen trans activists and the family of Nikki Nicholas marched through downtown Lansing on March 9 to draw attention to hate-motivated violence in Michigan. The rally, organized by the newly formed group, National Association for the Advancement of Transgender People, was held in honor of Nicholas, who was murdered on Feb. 21 at the age of 19. Marchers came to the Capitol in hopes that their presence would draw attention to the need for a statewide hate crime law that includes LGBT people.

## FLASHING BACK TO THE PAST:



**April - MI Gay Prisoners Will No Longer Be Identified:** The Michigan Department of Corrections decided to stop identifying prisoners as "homosexuals" on its forms and records, which resulted in incidents of harassment, violence and discriminatory treatment against LGBT inmates. The move followed a lengthy battle with the ACLU and proactive citizens. Such information was "often shared recklessly by staff among each other and with other inmates, even though this information should not have been disclosed," said Jay Kaplan, staff attorney at the ACLU of Michigan LGBT Project.



**September - Gay Gun Advocates Start 'Pink Pistols':** A Michigan chapter of the Pink Pistols was started by Albert Lowe. The gay gun-rights group had at the time 37 chapters in the U.S. and at least 5,000 members. Lowe said his primary reason for starting the Michigan chapter was to provide a forum to "go out and have fun target shooting" in an atmosphere that is friendly to gays, lesbians and others who may not feel comfortable in traditional gun groups.

**July - Local Paper Will Print Same-Sex Marriage Announcements:** Joining the ranks of five other newspapers in Michigan, the Lansing State Journal announced that beginning on July 27, the paper will print same-sex engagement, commitment ceremony and marriage announcements in its "Living" section. As a part of GLAAD's "Announcing Equality" campaign, 211 newspapers began printing same-sex union announcements. Michigan papers included the Ann Arbor News, Detroit News, Kalamazoo Gazette, Saginaw News, Oakland Press and LSJ.



## HIV/AIDS HAPPENINGS IN 2003

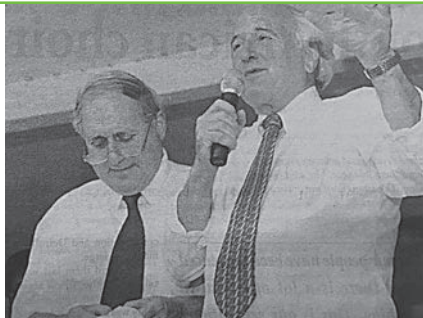
**Ypsilanti Twp. OKs Needle Exchange:** The Ypsilanti Township Board approved an exemption to allow a six-month-long needle exchange program in the township to help reduce the spread of HIV among addicts who share needles. According to the plan, HIV & AIDS Resource Center in Ypsilanti started distributing new needles to drug users in the township. HARC also culled old needles from drug users as well.

**HIV/AIDS Education Efforts Take Root Among Arab Men:** With the help of two grants, the Midwest AIDS Prevention Project and the Arab Community Center for Economic and

**State Study Links Bisexuality to HIV Spread Among Minority Women:** Black and Hispanic women were being infected with HIV at a higher rate than the rest of the population in part because many of them didn't know their sex partners were bisexual, according to a study conducted by the Michigan Department of Community Health and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The study found that among HIV-infected men who had sex with other men, 34 percent of black men said they engaged in bisexual behavior, followed by 26 percent of Hispanic men and 13 percent of white men. Of the HIV-positive women studied, 14 percent



of white women knew their partner engaged in bisexual behavior, but only 6 percent of black and Hispanic women knew of such behavior by their partners. The study suggested that the disparity in awareness helps account for the rapid spread of HIV in the black community.

**MAPP Uses the Power of the Internet to Fight HIV/AIDS:** As chat rooms began to replace bathhouses, public restrooms and bookstores, the Midwest AIDS Prevention

Project changed the way they targeted the new generation of gay and bisexual men. Using the screenname "SexEd4U," counselors identified themselves in online chat rooms as HIV educators to give people the opportunity to ask questions about HIV, sexually-transmitted diseases and specific risk behaviors.

**Levins Step Out to Fight AIDS:** Sen. Carl Levin (D-MI) and his brother Congressman Sander Levin (D-Royal Oak) served as honorary co-chairs of Steppin' Out's AIDS Walk Detroit in September. This was the fifth year the Levins had helped lead the group's fundraising efforts in the battle against HIV/AIDS.

**AIDS Activist and Doctor Dies:** Isabello C. Reyes, Jr., MD, who died on Sept. 27, 2003, worked tirelessly and stood on the front lines advocating for the rights, providing care and instruction, free of charge, for people infected and affected by HIV/AIDS.

# Whitmer Prohibits State Employment Discrimination on Grounds of Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity

**FERNDALÉ** – Gov. Gretchen Whitmer signed an executive directive Monday at Affirmations, Michigan’s largest LGBTQ community center, that broke new ground regarding civil rights protections for the LGBTQ community. Directive No. 2019-9 outlined that it would help instill policies to “promote public confidence in the fairness and integrity of state government” by ensuring all Michigan residents receive fair treatment in “employment, state contracting, and when accessing services from state government.” The directive strengthens protections in these four ways:

- 1.) Clarifying that employment protections cover all state employees, including classified and unclassified employees.
- 2.) Requiring all recipients of state contracts, grants and loans to extend protections to their employees.
- 3.) Prohibiting discrimination in state services.
- 4.) Extending prohibitions on discrimination to include discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity or expression – which will now be consistent with the action taken by the Michigan Civil Rights Commission in May, 2018.

“It’s pretty tremendous,” said ACLU of Michigan Staff Attorney Jay Kaplan. “This is pretty all-encompassing and it’s a big step forward toward LGBT equality in Michigan. I think it helps build momentum and set the stage for ultimately what we need, which is to amend our civil rights law to specifically include sexual orientation and gender identity so every aspect of Michigan life would be covered in that respect.”

Kaplan added that her “directive went a long way toward doing the things the state

of Michigan is able to do even without the legislature” to ensure the fair treatment of LGBTQ people in the state and so they “have dignity in accessing governmental services.”

Whitmer’s actions earned praise from Equality Michigan as well, the only statewide advocacy organization representing Michigan’s LGBTQ community.

“Modernizing Michigan’s policies to make it clear that discrimination against LGBTQ people will not be tolerated is long overdue,” said Erin Knott, Equality Michigan Interim Executive Director. “We are proud to stand alongside Gov. Gretchen Whitmer as she takes an important step to protect Michigan’s LGBTQ community from discrimination. This is a welcome solution to a problem that our community has faced for

far too long.”

State Sen. Jeremy Moss (D-Southfield) called the move “an encouraging step forward.”

“Michigan lags behind the rest of the country in protecting our LGBT community from discrimination,” Moss said. “While many gay and trans people in other states have held onto the hope that equality will continue to progress, Michigan residents have questioned whether our state would start progressing at all.”

In a press release Whitmer said that not only will the directive help a marginalized group feel more accepted, but it will benefit everyone in Michigan too.

“If we’re going to attract the talented workforce our businesses need to create jobs and grow our economy, then we’ve got to get on the right side of history,” Whitmer said. “That’s what this executive directive is all about. By strengthening non-discrimination protections in state government employment, contracting and services, we will make Michigan a model of equal opportunity and build a more welcoming and inclusive state that works for everyone.”

Kaplan concurred.

“I think she sent a strong message about this administration and that they consider this a priority. They consider it a priority not only about treating people fairly in providing equal opportunities but also what kind of message does the state send if they have policies and practices that are not inclusive that exclude groups of people or marginalize populations,” he said. “When you do things like that it

negatively impacts the state’s economy. ... [She is not] only doing the right thing, the just thing, but is also providing more opportunities for people to want to come to Michigan and invest in the state.”

Knott said that this action is a direct motion for legislature to follow suit in expanding Michigan’s existing civil rights act.

“It’s an example that the Michigan Legislature should follow by taking immediate, meaningful action,” Knott said. “First, they should adopt rules in the House and Senate to protect their own employees from anti-LGBT discrimination. Then, they should, at long last, expand the Elliott-Larsen Civil Rights Act to make it fully inclusive for all Michiganders.”

## Sen. Moss Named Democratic Assistant Minority Leader

**LANSING** – Last week Sen. Jeremy Moss (D-Southfield) was selected to serve as the Assistant Minority Leader for the Michigan Senate Democratic Caucus.

“I am honored to work with my Senate colleagues and our governor, alongside Leader Ananich, as assistant leader of the Senate Democratic Caucus. A divided government can present a series of challenges, and a series of opportunities. I will be looking for the opportunities in the State Senate to push for bipartisan solutions to boost wages, improve our schools and invest in our infrastructure — while never shying away from the progressive values instilled within me from the 11th Senate District.”

Moss is openly gay and represents the cities of Farmington, Farmington Hills, Ferndale, Hazel Park, Huntington Woods, Lathrup Village, Madison Heights, Oak Park, Pleasant Ridge, Southfield and the Charter Township of Royal Oak.



# Gov. Acts on Line 5, Requests Attorney General Review

LANSING – Gov. Gretchen Whitmer has requested a legal opinion from Attorney General Dana Nessel regarding the constitutionality of the recent Enbridge Line 5 pipeline legislation and the new Mackinac Straits Corridor Authority created by outgoing Gov. Rick Snyder.

“Resolving any legal uncertainty regarding PA 359: the Mackinac Straits Corridor Authority, and action taken by the authority is necessary to assure that we can take all action necessary to protect the Great Lakes, protect our drinking water and protect Michigan jobs,” Whitmer said. “I pledged to take action on the Line 5 pipeline on day one as governor, and I am holding true to that campaign promise.”

The Enbridge Line 5 tunnel runs across Michigan from Superior, Wisconsin, to Sarnia, Ontario, carrying oil and gas across the state. During the 2018 lame duck period, Snyder reached an agreement with Canadian energy company Enbridge to decommission the 65-year-old pipeline that runs through the water in the Straits of Mackinac with a bedrock-reinforced tunnel. Its aim would be to provide stricter protections for the section of pipeline that sits in the water. It’s estimated to cost between \$350 million and \$500 million and expected to take up to 10 years to

complete. Enbridge has agreed to pay for the tunnel’s design, construction, operation and maintenance for up to 99 years.

The newly created Straits Tunnel Authority — an independent state agency that oversees operation of the Mackinac Bridge and would own the tunnel, leasing space to Enbridge — agreed to move forward with the project on Dec. 19 of last year.

In a Bridge Magazine report by Jim Malewitz, Heidi Grether, Director of the Michigan Department of Environmental Quality, said that the tunnel would do much to eliminate the potential oil leaks, as well as provide the ability to house infrastructure like electrical lines and broadband cables.

“This solution offers the greatest possible safeguards to Michigan’s waters while maintaining critical connections to ensure Upper Peninsula residents have the resources they need,” Grether said. “This historic agreement will result in eliminating nearly every risk of an oil leak in the Straits.”

The report also quoted Enbridge officials as saying that beyond stymieing the chance of leaks, the tunnel would “eliminate the potential for an anchor strike.” Last April, a ship’s anchor made three dents in the existing pipeline running through the Straits. Though Enbridge officials emphasized that the dents did

not impact the normal function of the pipeline, the news re-energized environmental activists to push for a total shutdown of Line 5 due to the potentially catastrophic nature of an oil leak in the straits which could cost the state billions of dollars. Oil and Water Don’t Mix, a coalition of environmental activist groups opposed to the pipeline, cited that almost 23 million gallons of oil flow through the pipeline daily and that during the several-year project to build the tunnel the chances of a leak would increase. The Bridge report also said that if electrical lines were routed through the oil-carrying tunnel that the chances of an explosion would increase.

“Pipelines do not belong in the Straits of Mackinac, period,” said Coordinator of Oil and Water Don’t Mix Sean McBrearty in a 2018 Detroit Free Press Report by Keith Matheny. “Our state’s economy, tourism and way of life revolves around keeping our Great Lakes in a pristine condition. There’s simply too much at stake to keep Line 5 in operation.”

Both Nessel and Whitmer have been vocal about their support of a Line 5 shutdown. Currently, Nessel’s opinion on the issue is pending, though she has been vocal about her Line 5 environmental concerns.

“There are serious and significant concerns regarding PA 359, which the previous governor and legislature initiated and passed without

the care and caution one would expect for an issue that will have a monumental impact on our state,” Nessel said in a statement. “Gov. Whitmer has rightly – and immediately – raised important questions about the legality and statutory underpinnings of this Act and my office is prepared to tackle her request for an opinion immediately. I encourage any interested or concerned party to forward a brief or legal memo on the issues raised by the opinion request.”

Nessel added that, “Those who stand to benefit from this Act” should “take heed that this request raises serious legal concerns. In no way should any entity rely on this Act to move forward unless and until these matters have been resolved.”

# Affirmations Looks to Restructure With Resolve

It had only been a few weeks, but Jennifer Johnson's daughter had started to look forward to Fridays; that's when she'd visit Affirmations and take part in the youth programs available there. Fridays were also the day that Johnson had come to trust that she'd have a reliable, safe space in which her openly LGBTQ daughter could be herself.

"Each time she [goes she] says she has a great time and it's a place where she can be herself. She has become more open and she's still a cranky teenager," Johnson said with a laugh, "but not as cranky as before."

That's why when the Ferndale-based LGBTQ community center sent out news in November that they were experiencing financial difficulties, many members of Metro Detroit's LGBTQ community, along with allies like Johnson, began to worry. The news seemed especially grim, too: Affirmations, the largest LGBTQ community center in the state, had depleted most its reserves and was facing an impending shutdown only six months away. When a community chat was held to discuss the situation, even Johnson's 13-year-old daughter wanted to attend; her newfound Friday night routine was at stake along with hundreds of others who regularly use Affirmations' services.

"When I asked her about going to this community chat I said I'm not quite sure what was going on, that Affirmations might be having some kind of financial challenges," Johnson said. "I asked her, 'Do you want to stay home or do you want to go?' And she said she wanted to go. And I thought that was interesting because what 13-year-old kid wants to go to a meeting like that? But she was OK with it."

And the Johnsons weren't alone. That Dec. 10 community chat meeting was well attended by dozens of concerned Affirmations supporters. Throughout that chat and the following Dec. 12 board meeting — the center's final two public meetings for the 2018 year — community concerns and the center's finances were discussed at length. The verdict: due to aggressive restructuring, Johnson's Fridays would remain intact for the time being. The center's cash flow appears to have been stabilized, at least

through the middle of 2019, but at a cost.

Much of that restructuring focused on cutting services and positions not absolutely necessary for the center to stay afloat. This report will provide a look at the many services that Affirmations is still providing throughout its ongoing restructuring process, steps taken by its board to raise revenue and how Affirmations stands now compared to similar centers across the U.S.

## Stopping the Leak

According to current board members, most of whom have held their positions officially since May 2018, the single largest drain on Affirmations' fiscal resources was staff payroll. This, coupled with inaccurate earnings projections and a trend of revenue deficits over the last several years, made for an unsustainable system that came dangerously close to failing at the end of last year. Board President Mike Flores illustrated this point.

"If you look at the budget for 2014, they had a \$1.2 million budget. They were expecting to bring in \$1.2 million and they were expecting to provide \$1.2 million worth of services. They only brought in about \$900,000," Flores said. "Last year, we predicted about \$800,000 worth of services and were able to bring in about \$760,000. This year, we're closer to \$600,000."

Beginning the year, Board Member Cheryl Czach said that the center's payroll costs ran about \$30,000 monthly. When the center got to a point with only \$60,000 available in its reserve funds, she said restructuring was imperative.

"We desperately had to make a change and we made the very difficult decision to restructure. None of us wanted to let staff go," Czach said. "It's not an easy choice to make and since then our staff has been working really, really hard to try and fill the gap and the board has been really active. We are in the center regularly doing staff meetings, we're talking about covering shifts when we need to so that people can go on PTO [personal time off]."

Going into detail about 2018's reserve fund allocations at the community chat, Flores described when the board drew from the reserves to keep the center afloat.

"Three separate occasions have happened in the last eight months where \$30,000, \$10,000 and \$30,000 [respectively] were requested from the cash reserves," he said. "The first cash reserve [draw] happened in the March/April time frame for \$40,000."

At that time the Center was actively searching for a new executive director to fill the vacant position and estimated that it would cost at least \$10,000 to find candidates. Czach, who led those efforts, was able to complete her search without touching those funds.

"Then Cheryl explained that she returned \$10,000 back to the cash reserves and immediately the leadership asked for \$10,000 to be able to meet cash flow demands," Flores said. "Basically what that means is that we needed to pay our employees and we were unable to do so. ... Then, as late as October, there was another request for \$30,000 because again we were unable to meet our cash flow demands to pay our employees."

Flores then addressed the direct plan of action being used to help stop the loss of money that the center was facing.

"Number one is stopping the bleeding. Number two is only keeping the essential services. Number three is reaching out to your major donors and number four is taking a breather. We've done the first two, we've started on number three," Flores said, adding that over the next six months the center's leaders hope to develop a clearer financial action plan.

According to year-end financial charts passed out at the Dec. 12 board meeting, Affirmations' cash flow looked stable through the beginning of February. During that meeting Flores also expressed confidence in opening its doors for Ferndale Pride in June.

The next board meeting is scheduled for February. This week a new community chat was announced for Jan. 16 at 6:30 p.m. (check [goaffirmations.org](http://goaffirmations.org) and [pridesource.com](http://pridesource.com) for updates).

## The Path to Rekindling Relationships

Per the third step of the plan, current board members said that Affirmations is now dedicated to reaching out to its regular and former donors to ensure that beyond grants, the center has a regular and reliable source of funding

from its members. If successful, the gradual return of these donors that Affirmations has been steadily accruing since its inception in the late 1980s should help in offsetting the center's payroll and operating costs. However, it might not be as simple as placing a few phone calls or sending out several appeal letters to donors who haven't been contacted in a while. Successfully restructuring will mean reactivating old relationships and proactively maintaining them.

According to Alice McKeage, a former board member and existing center partner, she is eager to aid the center in its time of need, but hasn't received any appeals in months — and it's not only among fellow center partners

“As a supporter of Affirmations, I have to say that one of the things that really concerns me is that I'm still a center partner. When my credit card expires, I call and give them new information. I have talked to so many [former donors] this past year who say, ‘Oh, they don't have that program anymore,’” she said. “And it's because nobody contacted them to say, ‘We tried to run your center partner donation and your credit card is wrong.’”

Board member Tim Lantzy said that part of the reason behind this slow outreach is a long-term database issue that the center only recently identified.

“We have four different databases that reach out to our donors and none of them were talking to each other,” Lantzy said at the Dec. 10 community chat. “None of them were collecting updated information. None of them were working so one thing we started doing in the last two or three weeks to get them to talk to each other to get them to communicate.”

Lantzy also encouraged existing members of the donor system reach out to Affirmations to make sure that the center has updated contact information. This will ensure that supporters stay up to date on center happenings via mail and email announcements.

Beyond targeting individual donors, the board has taken proactive measures in reaching out to “subject matter experts” and made an appeal to gain more knowledge about Affirmations history.

“We have reached out to several crisis managers, we have quotes from them, and, to former board members, and I think it's a disadvantage that so many of us are new because we don't know you,” Czach said to supporters at the community chat. “Thank you for coming and please introduce yourselves and I would love to talk with you about getting some historical knowledge of the organization that we simply don't have.”

Czach's comment points further than just the currently appointed board, too. Affirmations' history of former executive directors shows

that for almost a decade, the center has been in a state of relative flux regarding new staff hires and appointments. Since former executive director Leslie Thompson's departure from the center in 2011 (she was the last long-term employee in her position, having served for 11 years), Affirmations has seen the entry and departure of six consecutive executive directors/interim directors, many of whom brought with them new board members and different means of leadership. An attendee at the community chat, Michael Einheuser, emphasized the impact this fluctuation has had on Affirmations' overall function and the difficulty for new directors and board members to get acquainted with the center without stability.

“It's not going to be a matter of just going out and asking for money,” he said. “... We have to keep the doors open and there's a legacy out there, and for all the donors who put money in, the doors have to stay open over and beyond that. I think a great deal of time and attention needs to be put to looking at management, governance and particularly on leadership.”

## National Comparison

Centerlink is a national organization that helps develop relationships between LGBTQ community centers across the U.S. In partnership with the Movement Advancement Project, an organization dedicated to increasing LGBTQ equality, the two groups released an Aug. 2018 report that helped create a comprehensive overview of 128 U.S. LGBTQ community centers' capacity, programs, services and needs. Though Affirmations was not a participant in the surveys conducted for the 2018 Report, the comparison between national averages provides a perspective on its existing ability to provide services and its impact on the Metro Detroit LGBTQ community.

### Center Capacity

Affirmations is unique in that it has an owned physical space. The report found that though “nine out of 10 centers have a physical space,” the majority, 63 percent, rent while only 27 percent owned the buildings.

“One in 10 centers lacks a dedicated physical space; all but one of these centers have budgets of \$150,000 or less,” said the report.

At the end of 2018 Affirmations had total revenues of about \$600,000 putting it among the larger centers in the U.S. However, due to its total expenses of nearly \$770,000 this past year, it was on track to create a loss of \$170,000. It is important to note that that sum includes \$92,000 of depreciation on the building – a

non-cash expense. The “cash” deficit of \$78,000 was plugged with the draws from the reserves discussed by board president Mike Flores at the community chat.

Affirmations is also in the minority of centers that are open to provide services more than 40 hours a week. Even with shortened hours, the center is currently available to serve community members 45 hours a week, providing potentially life-saving services like STI and HIV testing and community support — this year alone the center provided 121 days dedicated to free and confidential HIV/STI testing. Affirmations also follows suit with the report's 83-percent majority that provides “all gender restrooms” for visitors.

### Center Staff and Boards of Directors

Affirmations is among the half of participating centers that are “thinly staffed” and is in the 32 percent that has between one and five paid staff members. Currently, Affirmations does not have an executive director, but board members are in the process of conducting a search for someone to take on that position. That aligns the center with 35 percent of centers across the U.S. that are in similar circumstances and have high rates of executive director turnover — having had a new one almost every year for the past four years. Currently, Affirmations ranks below the national average regarding diversity on its board, 18 percent compared to 39 percent. Due to current low staffing, the rates for Affirmations' diversity regarding its staff are unreliable.

### Budgeting

Affirmations' budget far exceeded almost half of centers nationally, whose budgets were \$150,000 or less. However, among large LGBTQ community centers Affirmations was below the average 2018 expense budget of \$1.1 million.

### Programming

Affirmations is among 88 percent of its peers in offering transgender-specific programming, among 83 percent of those centers offering LGBTQ youth-focused programming and activities, and among 68 percent of centers that offer physical and mental health care. It is also among three quarters of centers that provide computer access for its visitors.

Annually, Affirmations has provided these services to more than 35,000, provided LGBTQ+ 101 Trainings for 1,700 individuals, including representatives from major health care systems, schools and other businesses in the region.

## Services Provided and Existing Staff

Entering 2019 Affirmations is open Tuesday through Saturday from 11 a.m. through 8 p.m. and offers both support and discussion, along with recovery-focused groups. In 2018 the center served 8,880 community members through its discussion programming – 750 of those members are LGBTQ youth. Beyond those services, Affirmations offers programs like tobacco quitting resources, relationship skills classes, counseling services, HIV and STI testing, LGBTQ education and learning labs and even includes a gallery for local artists to showcase their work. # Hate Literature Littered Ferndale Cars New Year's Eve

Racist hate literature was found on cars in Ferndale New Year's Eve. The fliers, created by a white supremacist group based out of Texas, were met with disdain and disapproval by local community leaders.

"Ferndale is well-known in Metro Detroit as an inclusive and welcoming community, which has directly contributed to the popularity and success of the city overall," Ferndale Mayor Dave Coulter said. "While there's little chance these hateful messages will resonate with residents and visitors here, I suspect the authors hope to leverage that popularity for attention."

Julia Music, event chair for the annual Ferndale Pride festival, agreed that the fliers had no place in the city.

"The fliers have not been welcomed by Ferndale residents because as the city has grown, we have strived to be welcoming to all types of people," she said.

However, despite Ferndale's vocal policy of tolerance and acceptance, it has received its fair share of hateful messages. Just a few months ago in September, several business owners displaying rainbow flags received hate mail condemning LGBTQ people.

## Karen Prins Resigns From OOTL Board

One of the founding board members of Out On The Lakeshore LGBTQ community center has resigned to spend more time with family and friends. Karen Prins, who was one of the initial board members for OOTL when it was founded in 2015, does not yet have a replacement.

"I have reached the great age of 70, and don't mind saying so, and I would like to chill out more and spend more time with family and friends, all who live not just locally but across the country as well," Prins said. "I love to travel."

And as active as Prins currently is within the LGBTQ community, traveling might be made difficult. She is an active member of the Holland/Lakeshore PFLAG chapter; was one of the initiators and initial facilitators for a transgender support group in Holland that is now known as Gender SAFE; has helped plan and put on the first outdoor PRIDE Festival; and is a former Holland Is Ready board member.

Though she had no plans to be as active local LGBTQ causes when she moved back to Holland in 2008 to take care of her ill mother, she attended a local Holland/Lakeshore PFLAG meeting in 2009 and everything changed.

"I was fortunate to attend my first PFLAG support meeting in 2009. My whole existence in Holland, as a lesbian, took its positive

"You have rolled out the red ... no, rainbow, carpet for them," the letter, not signed but postmarked from Houston, Texas, said in part. "THIS IS MADNESS."

This time, the hate literature, which came from a group affiliated with the website bloodandsoil.org and operating under the name of The Patriot Front, spoke in its "manifesto" of reclaiming America.

"When our European ancestors first came to this savage continent, they had a variety of purpose," reads one section of the document. "Set against the harsh life on the frontier and the common enemy in the strange, unexplored reaches of America yet to be touched by civilization, they found a common cause and a common identity as Americans. From the varied nations and cultures of Europe a new nation was forged in the flames of conquest. E Pluribus Unum was the new creed that bound our people together with their pan-European identity as Americans. To be an American is to be a descendant of conquerors, pioneers, visionaries, and explorers. This unique identity was given to us by our ancestors, and this national spirit remains firmly rooted in our blood."

The message, said Music, is disgusting.

"The idea that these flyers, mailers and

notices promote of 'returning' to a white, heterosexual, cisgender-only country are not only ludicrous but harmful to our ideals of growing a diverse community," she said, adding that Ferndale's diversity has made it greatly unpopular among a certain sect. "I believe Ferndale has become a target for these postings because people haven't taken the time to come to Ferndale, hang out downtown, meet locals and realize that this is a great place to live."

Music said she could see the group targeting "towns other than Ferndale who also embrace diversity," adding that she's sure the city will stand strong in its resolve to be accepting just the same.

"Until more towns across the U.S. embrace LGBT folks, cities like Ferndale will continue to welcome people who feel [like] outcast[s] or just want to live in a place where they can be themselves with open arms."

And diversity, Coulter said, is nothing to be afraid of.

"The irony is that if they spent time in Ferndale they might become less afraid of what they don't understand and more open to the benefits a diverse community provides."



conservative west coast. However, Out On The Lakeshore, since its beginnings as a concept, in 2015, always seemed to go forward with support from places we never dreamed would be as supportive as they are."

She added that over the years she served her community, she's felt the determination to push forward with LGBTQ causes in "many, many folks."

"[Who] wanted to give love and acceptance to Holland's LGBTQ Community, that simply has made any 'No' turn somehow into a 'Yes,'" she said. "Wow. Go Holland."

# Removal of Marriage From New Cuba Constitution Divides LGBTI Community

SANTA CLARA, Cuba — The LGBTI+ community remains divided after the National Assembly modified the marriage amendment in the draft of the new constitution. Part of it defends the yes vote and supports the official campaign, while another group says it will vote against the constitution.

On Saturday, Dec. 22, the same day the Cuban Parliament in Havana ended sessions where changes to the draft Cuban constitution were approved, a group of young people discussed them in Vidal Park in Santa Clara, 300 kilometers from the Cuban capital.

The decision to exclude Article 68, which defined marriage as “the union of two people,” from the future constitution was received with bewilderment in the city, which is known in the country for its inclusive spaces for the LGBTI+ community.

According to the National Assembly, the suppression has the goal of “respecting all opinions,” an argument that seems to echo the anti-marriage equality campaign from various evangelical churches.

Mariela Castro Espín had referenced to the “blackmail” of these religious groups in a recent interview, although nothing suggested the constitutional text would be modified for this reason and marriage would be subject to another referendum, as part of the Family Code, under a two year deadline.

Castro Espín directs the National Center

for Sexual Education (CENESEX) and is also the country's most well-known official LGBTI+ rights activist. Her work has been criticized because it intends to work the agenda of a minority that has been historically marginalized into the political discourse of the same government that has persecuted it and has not to this day offered reparations.

Ramón Silverio is another activist and cultural promoter who directs El Mejunje, a community center known across the country for its drag shows.

Silverio feels that the LGBTI+ community “did not do much to defend (Article 68).”

“There was no counterpart,” he admitted. “The churches had a lot of influence, combined with the homophobia that exists in society regarding the issue.”

Marriage now appears to be described in Article 82, a passage written in technical and ambiguous language with the declared goal of not closing the door on the legality of partners of the same sex and gender, despite the controversial referendum option.

“We are putting the rights of the most vulnerable people and groups in a somewhat critical position when taking them to a popular referendum,” warned Deputy Luis Ángel Adán Roble during Parliament's last session of 2018.

Adán Roble is the only deputy with a speech that mirrors LGBTI+ activism. In the closing session, however, he merely confirmed his support for the change and invited citizens to vote in favor of the draft constitution.

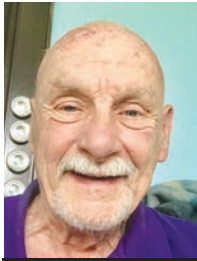

### Channeling Rainbow Creativity in 2019

As an artist, I'm fascinated with the mental phenomenon known as channeling. In the mid-'90s channeling was a cultural fad with many fans.

Channelers brought forth purported messages from age-old entities and other twilight-zone dimensions and previous lifetimes. Entities possessed the channel or medium who, in turn, delivered the message, the soul-saving advice — or so thousands believed.

One of the most popular was J. Z. Knight. She took mental dictation from Ramtha, a 30,000-year-old sage. (Ramtha's books brought J. Z. nationwide acclaim. And beaucoup tangible American bucks.)

The truth is that the brain is an instrument of incredible flights of creative fantasy. This is evident from a shared commonality: dreaming. How the brain weaves its nighttime imagery is amazing. Breathtaking. Frequently disturbing. Keep a dream journal and see for yourself.

I've had dreams, for example, in which I find myself walking into a gallery and seeing dozens of pictures hanging. Upon awakening I'm aware I've never seen this art before. How does the brain create it? And why only for mere seconds of mental display?

Asked how I make my art I say for statement shorthand that I channel it. I don't have a preconceived idea of what to create. I start. My art unfolds. (I have over 1,000 images on my iPhone.)

According to a recent article in "Scientific American" it takes approximately 10 years of daily application for whatever you are doing — art, music, cooking, bowling, playing golf — for your "gift" to become automatic, second nature.

The patterns of expertise become so woven into the fabric of your brain that "the process does you." You too become a channel. In other words, you don't have to give much thought to your golf swing. (It also helps if you're a lesbian.)

I make it a practice of thanking my brain. When I complete a painting, I say thank you. If I recall a long-forgotten name, I say thank you. If I recall lines of poetry, I say thank you. If given an insight or an intuition, I do the same. It works. Two words of gratitude: thank you. Try it and see.

As an artist I feel privileged (not infrequently, amazed, dumbfounded) by being a part of the creative act. Unquestionably, it's a spiritual thing. When I enter the creative zone it's admission into a "timeless space." I'm able to draw on seemingly unlimited psychic energy. Go all-nighters.

Here are some steps to enhancing or initiating creativity: First, learn the basics. Take courses, learn from experts. (Just because you can drip paint on a canvas doesn't make you a Jackson Pollock. Just because you can strum a guitar doesn't make you a Jerry Cantrell.) Unless you're a genius, you've got to pay creative dues to one day become expert.

### We Are One for the Ages

It amazes me how so many seem to view the notion of "transgender people" as if it was something that magically winked into existence just five years ago. It feels as if so many think the moment they first heard of transgender people is the moment transgender people came to existence, rather than it merely being the moment they stopped living in ignorance about the existence of transgender identity.

The truth is, transgender people have always been here.

Now it's not to say that you aren't seeing more transgender people being out and visible than you may have in the recent past. The thing is, everything is more visible now, with the rise of social media and the incessant 24/7 news cycle that always needs something to fill it.

On top of this, as acceptance and visibility for transgender people has

grown, more people are feeling safer about coming out as transgender — whether it be people coming out for the first time, or those who have long been stealth finally feel comfortable discussing their own transgender pasts.

So, it may well seem that there are a lot more transgender people at this time and place, and that could lead someone to think that this is somehow a new phenomenon.

The historical record is full of transgender stories, both in mythology and popular culture of the times. We know of the Cybele cult in Ancient Greece, whose members adopted female outfits and identity, and castrated themselves in the service of their deity, and of Egypt's Queen Hatshepsut, who wore male garments and a false beard. These are just two of a great many examples in the ancient world of what

we might call "transgender identity" today.

Then there's Queen Christina of Sweden, who abdicated the throne in 1654, adopting the masculine persona of Count Dohna, or the Chevalier d'Eon who opted to live as a woman in the 1770s. One can presume there were plenty more who were not of such renown, living their lives outside of the social columns of the day.

Because those are such old stories, however, it is hard to augment them with the terms of today. We do not know, for example, if Queen Hatshepsut adopted her garments as part of being a ruler, for example, and can only make educated guesses based on the historical record.

We can, however, pretty readily look at figures over the last 100 years,

however.

In 1918, some 20 years after Oscar Wilde set the stereotypes of gay male behavior that are still accepted by some today, a person who alternately went by Earl Lind and Jennie June released a book, "Autobiography of an Androgyne." Four years later she penned a second, "The Female-Impersonators."

The language is antiquated by today's standards, and conflates sexuality and gender throughout, but we can still see that June would have likely considered themselves nonbinary or transgender by today's standards.

While June was living in New York City, Jack Bee Garland was doing social work after serving in the U.S. military in the Philippines and writing for the San Francisco Examiner. He was a transgender man.

Meanwhile, in Germany, transgender and homosexual identities were enjoying a renaissance of sorts, as Magnus Hirschfeld opened the Institut für Sexualwissenschaft (Institute of Sexual Research) and transgender people saw their identities normalized in Germany.

There were popular nightclubs for transgender people in Germany at the time. Likewise, identity papers reflecting their gender identity, and plenty of other progressive views towards transgender identity, we fought for and won.

That is, until the Nazis burned down the institute and sent transgender people to the camps with their homosexual prisoners. Had things been different, maybe we wouldn't have a debate about how new "transgender" is today.

In the post-war era, as the United States tested nuclear bombs, the New York Times hailed a different "bombshell" when Christine Jorgensen returned from Europe after her gender change. With her followed many more through the '50s, into the Stonewall era, and

Second, set aside time on a regular basis, if only an hour or two, to be creative. Enjoy the process, rather than focusing on the outcome. View the act of creativity as a form of meditation. It really is.

Replace "I can't" with "I can." I will! Affirm: "I'm willing to discover my special gifts, my unique talents."

Personally, I believe we gay people are on average more creative than our straight

### Stedfast Baptist Church

**Unless, of course, you know about the absolutely heinously hateful shit Romero has said about gay people. Then any pity you have for him really evaporates.**

Welcome to this episode of "Christian Hypocrisy: Anti-Gay Christian Edition." It's been a while since we've done one of these so let's start off 2019 old-school style and call out an anti-LGBTQ public figure who turns out to not be so morally upstanding after all.

Let me introduce you to Donnie Romero, former pastor of the Stedfast Baptist Church in Fort Worth, Texas.

He's the former pastor because he did some sins that "disqualified" him from pastorhood.

Romero's pastor buddy Steven Anderson came to Stedfast Baptist Church so he could be there to help the church through Romero's announcement.

"These 50 Sodomites were all perverts and pedophiles and they are the scum of the earth, and the earth is a little bit better place now, and I'll even take it a little further," he said according to the Star-Telegram. "I heard on the news today that there are still several dozen of these queers in ICU, and I will pray that God will finish the job that that man started."

Now, I've been writing about anti-gay folks for over a decade now, and that is honestly one of the most vile quotes I have

ever encountered. The lack of compassion is astounding. And notice that the guy with the gun, the guy who murdered scores of people and injured many more, is viewed as a tool of God's will doing the Lord's work with an assault rifle. Never mind that the shooter was Muslim, which in most circumstances would probably be a deal-breaker for Romero and his church. Hey, nobody's perfect.

Anderson, too, is no stranger to hate.

# D.C. Circuit Court Sides with Trump on Trans Military Ban

A federal appeals court has sided with President Trump on his attempt to ban transgender people from the military, marking the first court victory for the administration on the anti-trans policy as litigation against it moves through the courts.

In a five-page decision, a three-judge panel on the D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals overturns a preliminary injunction issued by U.S. District Judge Colleen Kollar-Kotelly barring the Trump administration from banning transgender service members.

Although the D.C. Circuit has lifted one preliminary injunction against the transgender military ban, three more orders against the policy remain in effect. Transgender people will be able to continue to serve in the U.S. armed forces as litigation moves forward in the courts.

The unsigned ruling was a per curiam decision, which means it was unanimous. The three-judge panel consisted of U.S. Circuit Judge Stephen Williams, a Reagan appointee; U.S. Circuit Judge Thomas Griffith, a George W. Bush appointee; and U.S. Circuit Judge Robert Wilkins, an Obama appointee.

The opinion indicates Wilkins and Griffiths plan to issue a longer opinion at some time in the future and Williams plans a concurring opinion.

The order might also not be the D.C. Circuit's final word on the transgender military ban. The opinion itself notes "today's decision is not a final determination on the merits," but a decision on a whether a preliminary injunction should remain in place as litigation continues.

Cited as the D.C. Circuit's reason for lifting the order is the plan issued by former Defense Secretary James Mattis seeking to implement Trump's 2017 tweet and subsequent order against allowing transgender people to serve "in any capacity" in the military.

The court concludes Kollar-Kotelly "made an erroneous finding that the Mattis Plan was not a new policy" because she ignored certain nuances about the plan.

"The government took substantial steps to cure the procedural deficiencies the court identified in the enjoined 2017 Presidential Memorandum," the order says. "These included the creation of a panel of military and medical experts, the consideration of new evidence gleaned from the implementation of the policy on the service of transgender individuals instituted by then-Secretary of Defense Ash Carter ('the Carter Policy'), and a reassessment of the priorities of the group that produced the Carter Policy."

The Mattis plan allows transgender people to continue to serve in the military if they "have been stable for 36 consecutive months in their biological sex" and do not seek transition-related case, such as gender reassignment surgery, are not diagnosed with gender dysphoria or came out as transgender

during the period of open service under former Defense Secretary Ashton Carter during the Obama administration.

Although transgender advocates have made the case gender dysphoria is a defining characteristic of being transgender and thus the policy amounts to a full-fledged ban, the court disputes that notion.

"We can find nothing in the record to support this definition of being transgender, as all of the reports supporting both the Carter Policy and the Mattis Plan defined transgender persons as 'identifying' with a gender other than their biological sex," the order says. "Indeed, those reports repeatedly state that not all transgender persons seek to transition to their preferred gender or have gender dysphoria."

The order also cites legal precedent requiring courts to give deferences to the military on whether individuals are eligible for combat.

"We must recognize that the Mattis Plan plausibly relies upon the 'considered professional judgment' of 'appropriate military officials,' and appears to permit some transgender individuals to serve in the military consistent with established military mental health, physical health and sex-based standards," the order says.

The ruling was handed down in the case of *Doe v. Trump*, the case against the transgender military ban filed by the National Center for Lesbian Rights and GLBTQ Advocates & Defenders.

Shannon Minter, legal director for the National Center for Lesbian Rights, said in a statement the ruling is "a devastating slap in the face to transgender service members who

have proved their fitness to serve and their dedication to this country."

"We will keep fighting this cruel and irrational policy, which serves no purpose other than to weaken the military and punish transgender service members for their patriotism and service," Minter said.

Minter told the *Blade* the legal team is considering asking the D.C. Circuit for an en banc rehearing, adding, "This is not a final decision on the merits, and we are very confident of our ability to make our case in the district court as the case proceeds."

Jennifer Levi, director of the Transgender Rights Project for GLBTQ Advocates & Defenders, said in a statement the opinion is "based on the absurd idea that forcing transgender people to suppress who they are in order to serve is not a ban."

"It ignores the reality of transgender people's lives, with devastating consequences and rests on a complete failure to understand who transgender people are," Levi said. "It is also destabilizing to the military to so dramatically reverse a policy that has been in place for over 2 years that senior military officials acknowledge has operated with no problems."

The U.S. Justice Department didn't immediately respond to the *Blade's* request to comment on the opinion.

The D.C. Circuit issues the order less than a month after hearing oral arguments on whether to dissolve Kollar-Kotelly injunction against the transgender military ban. At the time, the three-judge panel didn't give a clear signal on which way they'd rule on the issue.

The order is handed down as the Justice

Department has two requests pending before the U.S. Supreme Court seeking intervention in three transgender military cases, including *Doe v. Trump*. The other two cases are *Karnoski v. Trump* and *Stockman v. Trump*, which are pending before the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals.

One request calls on the Supreme Court to take the rare step of granting review of the cases on an interlocutory basis to allow enough time for justices to issue final decision on the policy before the end of the year. The other seeks a stay on the preliminary injunctions against the policy, which would essentially allow the Trump administration to bar transgender service members as litigation moves forward.

Minter said the D.C. Circuit decision moots the Justice Department's request for cert before judgment and a stay in the *Doe v. Trump* case, but doesn't directly affect the Trump administration's requests before the Supreme Court in other cases.

With respect to those cases, Minter said the D.C. Circuit decision "may weigh against the court granting cert" because the Trump administration urged the Supreme Court to consolidate all of them.

"It does not directly affect the government's motion for stays of the injunctions in *Karnoski* and *Stockman*, though it certainly raises the stakes of that request, since the injunction in *Doe* has now been dissolved by the D.C. Circuit," Minter added.

TransCuba Network in Villa Clara Province, spoke without hesitation of what she considers a “lack of respect.” She is referring to the Article 68 modifications and the announcement of another referendum to approve the Family Code.

TransCuba is a group of transsexuals affiliated with CENESEX and led by Malú Cano, a trans woman who frequently appears with Mariela Castro in the media and on social media.

Dagnis is 36-years-old and says she was deported to the island after visiting some Latin American cities. “I left this country because of the rampant discrimination that exists, I have not been able to operate, I have not been able to do anything,” she explains.

Thirty-nine sex-reassignment surgeries have taken place in Cuba over the last decade, according to the *Trabajadores* newspaper in the middle of this year. A diagnosis of “gender dysphoria,” a requirement that part of the international trans advocacy movement rejects, is still required in order to reach the operating room.

Romero categorizes the country as “very late” and says living according to her gender identity leaves her feeling isolated everyday.

“Now they are taking away from me the possibility of forming a home,” she says in relation to the draft article.

Ramón Silverio, nevertheless, assures “a large part of this community has never been interested in marriage.”

“I don’t understand why there is this setback,” said Abel Raúl, a young man with Christian parents who moved to Villa Clara from eastern Cuba.

Mariela Castro Espín, (a member of the National Assembly) since the beginning of the debates has insisted that “there is no setback” and everything is due to a misinterpretation of the parliament’s first communiqué that was published on Twitter on Dec. 18.

CENESEX launched a social media campaign during the parliamentary sessions with the hashtag #IVoteYes and the slogan “Rewrite happiness.”

Castro Espín was the furthest away during parliament’s closing session and attributed the intention of numerous people to vote against the draft constitution over the exclusion of Article 68 the announcement of another popular consultation exclusively on marriage to the “counter revolution.”

Raisel Nuñez Medina, another one of the young people who spoke with Tremenda Nota in the park in Santa Clara, considers the debates around marriage “were as if it was something abnormal, and there were thousands of more important things to discuss.”

“I know couples who have lived in the same home for more than 30 years and had put their hopes in their legal union to make their future plans,” he says.

Ramón Silverio, who agrees with CENESEX’s position, supports Article 82 and wants to influence El Mejunje’s clientele in order to get more votes in favor of the draft constitution.


“Since Sunday we have been conducting a campaign that includes exhaustive explanations of the article,” he declared to Tremenda Nota. “I am convinced that the majority is going to vote yes in the referendum.”

“For its part, an LGBTI+ group from Placetas, a city near Santa Clara, on Dec. 25 made an announcement on Facebook that left out propaganda from the yes and no (factions) and reflects on the inconsistencies of official activism.

The group considers that the version of the marriage article approved by the parliament “does not satisfy the demands of the LGBTI communities.”

“Some activists were controlled by indications of waiting later,” said a document signed by CENESEX collaborators that denounced the claims.

The revelation seems to allude to instructions sent by the institution (CENESEX) to its “community networks” in order to avoid answering questions or public acts against the homophobic campaign that various evangelical churches have promoted. The declaration suggests Placetas LGBTI will vote in favor of the new constitution, although its members also demanded the elimination from the constitutional text the provision that “authorizes” the right to marriage equality to go to a referendum.

## Comedian Talks New Kink Series, Queer Sex and Hollywood Homophobia

**D**amn that bulging carpometacarpal joint. Without it, Margaret Cho's kink play could've been trouble-free, but nope – that thumb joint has been “the bane of my existence since 1991,” she tells me.

That's right: I talked to Margaret Cho and we somehow landed on the topic of fisting. These things happen! (They especially do if, like I did, you launch your convo with Cho by informing her that your introduction to the word “fisting” was via her early stand-up).

Clearly, our afternoon chat took many wild and sexually freewheeling turns when the trailblazing comic called to discuss executive producing “Mercy Mistress,” an Asian-led web series exploring BDSM through the relationship of its lead, a queer Chinese-American dominatrix named Mistress Yin (played by actress-activist Poppy Liu), and her new client. The series is based on sex-work activist and BDSM educator Yin Q's memoir. Difficult digits aside, Cho discussed her intro to kink, diversity casting, what makes queer sex special and why Christian Grey should've been a sub.

**You've long spoken openly about sex, sexuality and kink. Why is it important to you to talk about queer sex in your work?**

It's just another way to embellish identity. There are just ways of being ourselves, and when you're queer and you come out, you come out to a world where you kind of need to figure out who you are because the examples aren't out there for us. They aren't defined. The lanes aren't so, like, obvious (laughs). So, you really need to create it.

When I was growing up in the '80s and '90s we had to deal with AIDS, which was such a huge, difficult monstrosity to get your head around and also to understand what we could do sexually that was not fluid bonded, so that's where bondage and BDSM – all that kind of stuff – really came into the culture in a very, very big way. So, I was working in San Francisco at a lesbian BDSM collective making leather dildos and vaginas. (Laughs)

**I believe you're referring to Stormy Leather.**

Yeah. Way back when. And so I was just very interested in that world, and it just developed alongside everything. Now, BDSM is very mainstream with “Fifty Shades of Grey” and that kind of stuff, so it's cool.

**Is there a toy that you made that you were particularly proud of, like, “Hey, I did that”?**

No, because I wasn't designing them. It was more just the sheer number of ways you could make a strap-on. You could do a chin one, you could do a forehead one, like a unicorn. You could do a thigh one. I think the thigh one actually makes a lot of sense, ergonomically. It's actually better for the lower back than the traditional jockstrap harness.



**A strap-on that's easier on the lower back appeals to me as I get older.**

Yeah, you wanna make sure you can continue doing these repetitive movements. Strap-ons, there's a great appeal to them. They're really fun, and even if you're not necessarily in a queer sexual relationship, you could definitely use them in any way, shape or form. I think that it adds another element. If you can add another phallus, it's always a positive.

**Regarding your own queer sex education, whose examples were you following while growing up in the '80s?**

(Sex-positive feminist author) Susie Bright had a major role in that, and in the digital age somebody like (erotica writer) Violet Blue, who's a good friend of mine. Also (former porn actress and sex-positive feminist) Nina Hartley, who is a very, very old friend of mine and really great. They're people who really just showed me the ropes, as it were. (Laughs)

**Is "Mercy Mistress" a good introduction for somebody who doesn't know much about the kink world?**

Yeah, I think it's a great, great introduction. And also we're seeing Asian-Americans in a way we've never seen before, which I think is really incredible too. That's what I get really excited about. I think we've really gotten to this place that we're looking at diversity as something that is really necessary and really important, so I love that. And it really puts the control back into our hands, like we can actually control the narrative, as opposed to being an object; we're actually running the thing. That's really amazing.

**How did you get involved as a producer?**

My company, Animal Family, is one of the producers. We got into contact with the "Mercy Mistress" people; they just really spoke to us, and we really loved what they were doing. We loved the landscape of the world they were showing. We loved everything. It just seemed like a natural fit.

**When did your interest in kink first pique?**

Growing up in San Francisco around that era of queer politics was a very big deal. I grew up on Polk Street, which was really the epicenter; that and the Castro, where Harvey Milk was doing a lot of work. So I think being around all of that, it just seemed inevitable. My father owned a gay bookstore and he hired all these employees who were identifying in different ways, who were transitioning. Transitioning started in the '70s, which is an incredible thing if you think about how early this was. People were transitioning, of course, before that, but that was the first experience I have had with people who were deciding to define their own gender. I got hired at Stormy Leather and I started meeting trans men for the first time. Before that it was just male-to-female trans women, but this was different, when it was female-to-male transition. That was a very big, eye-opening thing; it just

gave female body sexuality so much agency, which I had never really experienced before, and I thought that was really amazing and powerful.

**In recent years, the trans community has been given a greater mainstream platform. But as we know, and as you point out, transgender people have existed for a very long time.**

Yeah, it's been there; it's just that we as a society haven't looked to them, and yet they've changed and shaped culture for centuries. It's really been forever but we just didn't know.

**I think the same can be said about the kink community in a way, don't you?**

It's something that's been there but we haven't explored it in a mainstream way.

**And when we do, do we get it right? Did "Fifty Shades of Grey" get it right?**

Well, my feeling about "Fifty Shades of Grey" is, for the Christian Grey character, there's no way he could actually be a dominant. He has to be a male submissive. Usually men who are wealthy, in great positions of power, and who have that much luxury at their disposal to kind of extend on their sexuality are going to be a male submissive because they are just sick of being in charge. That, to me, is where I find it to be off. It's almost like Cinderella or something. It's kind of this weird European folktale where these gender roles are very stringent and don't allow for the men to fully explore their potential in who they really could be.

**Because, according to Hollywood, it's the way a man should act.**

Yeah. And that's the reason for these stories: to enforce the status quo and keep the culture intact and keep us from overstepping. But I don't want to be told that when you're in there for fantasy. It's not authentic to me. But I appreciate that it exists – and I appreciate that it sent countless millions of people to explore what this kind of sexuality is.

**What perspective does "Mercy Mistress" offer on kink that hasn't yet been portrayed in the media?**

It's a real place of honesty and truth around what kink is. That it's just about a turn-on and the different kinds of people encountered in this world. The images of people in it are very authentic, which I think is very different.

**A gay character tells a straight character: "You all need some kind of manual to figure out kinky sex." What can LGBTQ people teach the straight community about kink?**

We listen to our instincts because that's all we have to go on. And that's the biggest truth: We do what we like because we fight so hard to get to do *what* we like.

**How does your "interests and limits" list these**

### days compare to your kink origins?

I've actually gotten way more vanilla, which is funny, because when you're out there, you're trying to show off a little bit, to some degree, as to what you can take and what you're able to handle (laughs). And embellish that – embellish your own prowess. As I'm approaching 50, rapidly, I feel like, actually, I'm much more sedate, but I appreciate all the things that I'm experiencing seeing. I think that's great. But yeah, still can't get that thumb-knuckle in for the fisting! (Laughs)

### Even all these years later?

All these years later, I could never get that thumb in there, and I always had this feeling of like, "I'm just not really good enough to do this." But you don't have to get the thumb in.

### It's still fisting without the thumb?

It's still fisting without the thumb! And, you know, it's really fun.

### In my mind, I'm still laughing about this thumb thing.

It's the first joint that comes out. I'm looking at my thumb right now. It's that first little thumb joint. I just cannot get it in – no matter how small their thumb is, that joint always stick out. That joint has been the bane of my existence since 1991. I just can't get it in there. No kind of lube is gonna (work) and I'm probably as stretched out as you can get and it's still not gonna happen.

### And you give up?

I give up. I'm done.

### When it comes to kink, does anything shock you anymore?

Mm, no. Because it's in the realm of play, nothing should be off-limits. It's play for a reason; it's just fantasy. It's these cathedrals we construct around our imagination; they have no bearing to what is in the real world, you know? If it's just play, everything is just play. People get into very wild situations that we don't have to judge or that we don't have to say, "That's too far," because it's not for public consumption; it's just between two people or between however many people have agreed on this particular fantasy.

### Have you seen "Call Me By Your Name"?

Yes, yes, I've seen that.

### Some in the queer community wanted to see Armie Hammer's character eat the peach after Timothée Chalamet's Elio ejaculated in it because that's what happens in the book. Was that a missed kink opportunity?

I think that's exactly what should happen, but homophobia still exists, even in the realm of film and in the realm of not even what's real,

but what's possible.

### It seems Hollywood is walking a tight rope. "Bohemian Rhapsody" was damaging when it comes to the way gay sex is portrayed in film. I think Hollywood really has muted our sex lives to be palatable for mainstream consumption. What's your take on the way queer sex is portrayed in mainstream Hollywood films?

We're always going to have to strive for better and strive for more. There are examples where it actually goes very well. I'm thinking about Wong Kar-wai's "Happy Together," which has incredible sex scenes, and that film is about 20 years old, and it's from Hong Kong and that's another element of it. Hopefully we'll get more of that.

But you know, it's still developing and still growing. There's just the complexity of the sexuality too. I just saw "Boy Erased," which to me did a great job in really talking about how we can be misguided and misunderstood, like whether it's assault, that it actually *can* be assault, that there's all these questions: Is this rape? And, yes, it is. That was actually the first time I had seen that issue come up in a mainstream movie.

### Do you think that scene was important?

I thought it was important because it was giving permission for a male survivor to say that it happened and there was no thinking of, "Oh, he deserved it," or, "He wouldn't mind that because he wanted that anyway." It being brought up was really meaningful, and as a survivor myself it was a really important thing that I had never seen in a film, especially with male characters. That kind of really blew my mind.

### I'd like to come back to Asian representation in media, since you blazed that trail with your 1994 sitcom "All-American Girl." As someone who keeps finding new ways to break that ground, and after "Crazy Rich Asians" and "Mercy Mistress," what do you hope is the next step for Asian representation?

I just hope there's more, which there is, which is great. I'm really excited about it. I'm so thrilled about "Crazy Rich Asians" and, of course, "All the Boys I've Loved Before." And now both of those projects are going to have sequels. They're already in the works; it's happening. And there's more and more. So now we're looking at more of an excitement around Asian-American participation in entertainment, which is something I've been working on for more than 20 years, trying to get there, so this is a realization of that dream. It's very exciting.

# From Struggle to Success

**M**elinda Phelps did not initially set out to be a certified public accountant. Born and raised in Detroit, and a product of Michigan colleges, Phelps first started out as a stockbroker. But as a proud African-American lesbian woman, Phelps said she could only go so far.

"I kept hitting the proverbial glass ceiling for black, gay women," Phelps said. "I was even told that gay people are not supposed to have management positions. So, I kept getting fired because of who I am."

At one firm, Phelps made the ultimate mistake – she asked a co-worker out on a date.

"I thought the signs were there for me to approach her, but I guess I scared her off," Phelps recalled. "She faked like she was engaged, even put on a ring that I didn't see before. She shared my text conversation asking her out to all our peers at work."

Immediately, Phelps said, she was shunned.

"We went to a week training where, by then, all of my peers knew I had asked

her out," said Phelps. "No one wanted to sit next to me on the plane. People were commenting about how disgusting I was to my face. ... It was clear that my career there was over."

Phelps then moved to Houston, but she couldn't get away from the alleged scandal.

"My reputation followed me," she said. "The accounting industry is very small, especially when you are known for highly specialized tax experience like I was at the time. From that point on, I knew that my career as an accountant would always be tainted by this experience."

Phelps moved on to other firms, but she kept facing the same problem and kept getting laid off or fired because of her openness about her sexuality.

"Because of so many layoffs back-to-back, it's even hard to this day to get a corporate job because my resume has all these short-term, but progressive, tenures at jobs," she said. "It makes it look as though I'm not trustworthy, or unstable, and jump job to job on purpose."

Feeling she had no other option, Phelps started her own practice, M.S. Phelps, CPA, PLLC. Initially, she started

in Texas, but shortly after she decided to come back to Michigan because of a close support system of family and friends she had built. Back home, Phelps built a practice catered to her specialties.

"I'm not your typical accountant," she said. "I'm more of a corporate tax accountant. Businesses like General Motors, Ford, they need people with my expertise to help them manage their tax situation because they are exposed to tax filing requirements in every city, state and country that they do business. That's what I primarily specialize in. Or small business owners who don't want to handle their accounting and tax situation so they outsource it to people like me to handle their bookkeeping and tax filing."

After starting her own business Phelps didn't have to worry about discrimination due to her sexuality, but she said she still faces difficulties associated with being a black, gay, female business owner from the outside community. She said in many ways she feels isolated and heartbroken.

"The reason why I say it's isolating is because you have no support from any community," Phelps said. "The African-American community believes that gay



people are evil and will go to hell, as they are influenced by their churches who teaches them this. All the other communities not only shun gay people, but they see blacks as inferior. Especially black women. We're looked upon as being angry, aggressive, almost ape-like."

But lack of support aside, Phelps said she has learned that in many ways she's a "fighter." She added that her difficulties in business have only spurred her on to work harder.

"I couldn't let them win. I may have lost many battles, but I didn't lose the war," she said. "I would advise anyone: don't give up on yourself. Stop listening to people. Believe your own instincts. When you fail, and you will, take it as a learning experience and strive to do better the next time around."

Today Phelps strives to find balance in life. In addition to her business Phelps also teaches accounting at Clair University as an adjunct professor, is in law school at Loyola University Chicago and is an avid golfer and networker.

Happy to be back home, Phelps said the best thing

about being back in Detroit is "the authenticity of people," she said. "People here are real about it. They keep it real and that's what I like and that's what I missed."

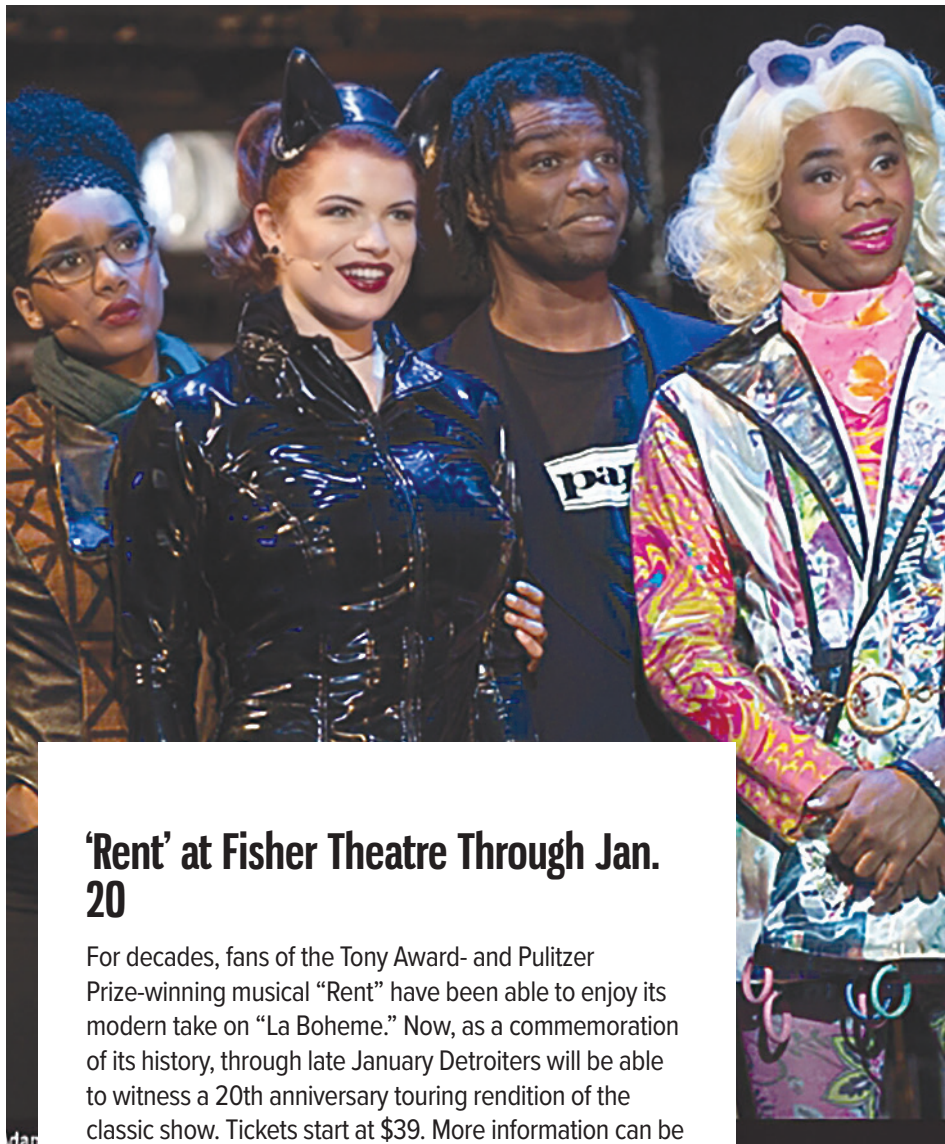

## 10 Best Queer Pop Culture Moments

Is it because we're all swimming together in the toxic Trump pool that makes every new addition to the LGBTQ cultural canon feel like an act of rebellion? Probably. But even if we were living in a queer-friendly political era, 2018's (they're calling it #20GayTeen on the Internet, just FYI) pop culture output would still be impressive. And

not just among ourselves – the mainstream took notice and we didn't have to dilute or code ourselves to make a splash there. The receipts:

1. "Pose" on FX forever smashed ideas about how much trans is too much trans for one show. TV mogul Ryan Murphy stepped back, let transgender actors, writers and directors take over, and it made the show more true, heartfelt and emotional than we even dared to hope for. And over on Viceland, the documentary series "My House" went into the real 2018 ballroom scene and let audiences know exactly what has changed since "Paris is Burning."

2. Janelle Monae's "PYNK" and its accompanying video served as a deliriously gorgeous and hypnotic ode to women of color – both cis and trans – loving other women of color, and it turned into a launching pad for best friends Monae and Tessa Thompson coming out, Thompson as bisexual and Monae as pansexual. If you're confused by the difference, there's always Google.

3. "The Miseducation of Cameron Post" and "Boy Erased," together, formed one solid movie about the toxic world of anti-gay Evangelical conversion camps for LGBTQ young people. "Miseducation" had a queer director in Desiree Akhavan, which informed the film's ability to get the anxiety and power of teenage desire just right, but "Erased," based on author Garrard Conley's lived experience in the church, dove deep into the terror and abuse of fundamentalist belief. See them both.

4. Broadway went Old School this year with revivals of Harvey Fierstein's "Torch Song Trilogy" (closing in January of 2019 and beginning a national tour) and the groundbreaking drama "The Boys In The Band," starring Jim Parsons. They're a reminder that within the lifespan of most

members of Generation X, the American public's perception of queer people has shifted in ways that make the word "dramatic" quite an understatement.

5. "Love, Simon" took heat for being about a relatively affluent suburban gay white boy, but as a mainstream multiplex entry with very long legs (its budget was somewhere around \$15 million and over its run raked in over 65) this teenage coming out and coming-of-age

story was the sweet John Hughes-esque comedy Hollywood hadn't yet bothered to make.

6. "Vida" was the Starz network's queer Latinx show you haven't watched yet, but when you do it will become your very favorite thing. About two Mexican-American sisters in East Los Angeles, it's a dramedy about identity and the making and breaking of family bonds. Go stream it!

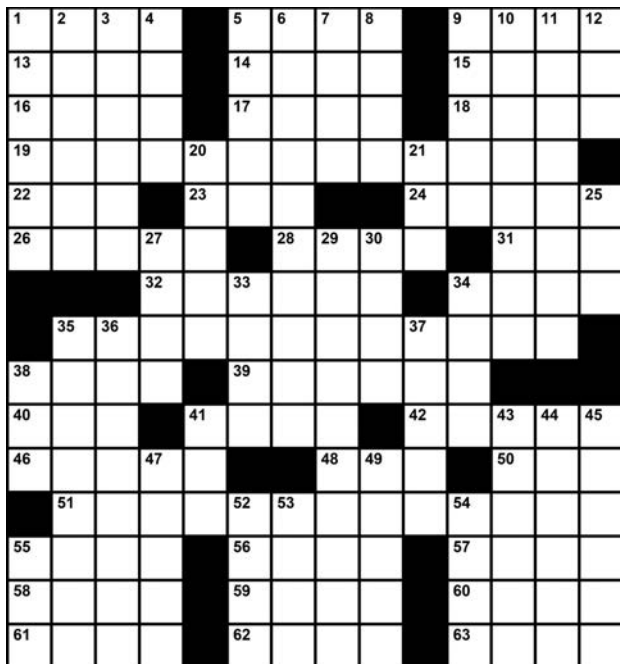
7. About a transgender woman going for and getting everything she knows she deserves in the face of *much* adversity, Chilean film "A Fantastic Woman" won the Academy Award for Best Foreign Language Film and made a rising star of Daniela Vega.

8. Listen, we still like "Queer Eye" even if we think Tan's fashion advice is a bit too transparently product placement for Bonobos and overly reliant on shirts that are only half tucked in (don't blame France for it, dude). We're into Jonathan's gleefully defiant attack on the masc4masc aesthetic. All day. Every day.

9. Here for lesbian drama: "Disobedience" with Rachel Weisz and Rachel McAdams had the hottest sex, "Skate Kitchen" had better skateboard skills than "Mid90s," "Lizzie" had the best violent attack on the patriarchy, and "The Favourite" had the fanciest, iciest, lady-on-lady seduction in the biggest royal costumes and tall wigs. All of them matter.

10. Haley Kiyoko was MTV's Push Artist of the Year at the 2018 "VMAs." Do you know her yet? You will when you go watch her video for "What I Need," which features queer singer Kehlani. Then you'll wonder why this story of young women running away to be together wasn't a feature-length film. Neither of these young ladies came to play, and you'll soon be seeing and hearing more from both.
